HOW TO MAKE ICED TEA Infuse six heaping teaspoons of Salada Black Tea in a pint of fresh, boiling water. After six minutes strain liquid into two-quart container. While hot, add 1 to 11/2 cups of granulated sugar and juice of 2 Jemons, strained. Stir well until sugar is dissolved, fill container with cold water. Do not allow tea to cool before adding the cold water; otherwise liquid will become cloudy. Serve with chipped ice.


