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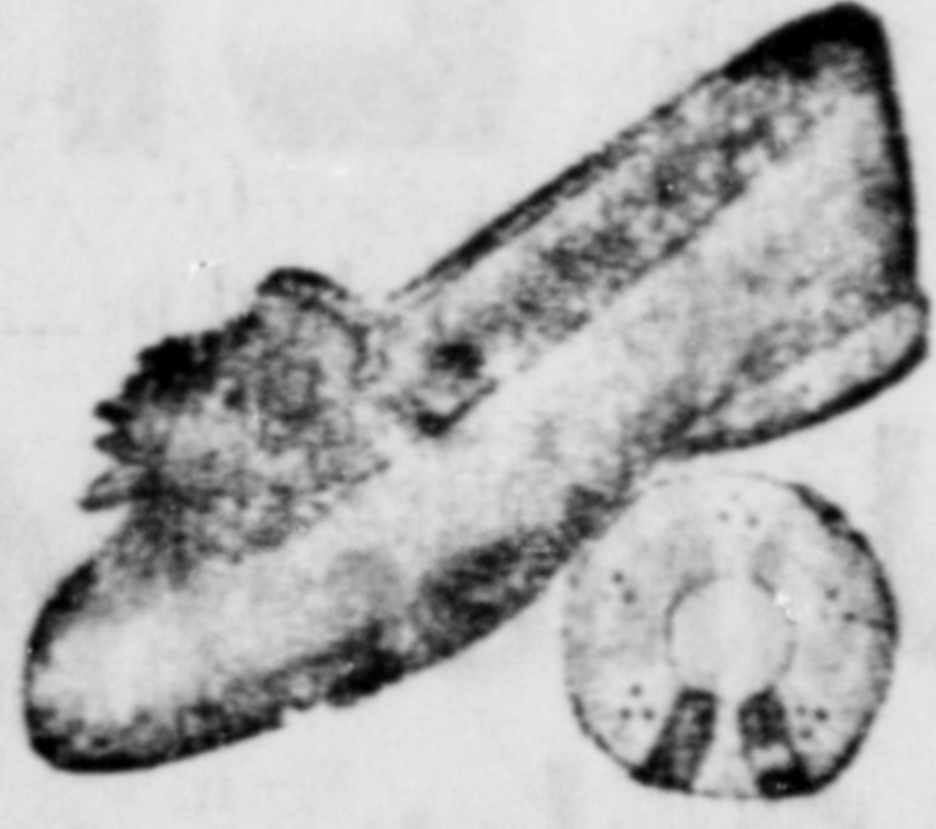

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PEOPLE WANT JOBS

Everybody wants a job of some kind. If he does not get it he is disgruntled. This is a very unpleasant feature of political life. Political managers know more about this than anybody else. They know the kind of importunity they have put up with. Some of the smaller political parties will tell you this is because of the system but it is just as prevalent in Russia under a wholly different system as it is today in Canada. People who have no jobs want one. People who have poor jobs, want better ones. All want jobs. Those who have the best jobs look for senatorships, judgeships, places on commissions, nominations for Parliament. All seem to be looking for jobs.

Most of the political differences are brought about through failure of somebody to get a job. When a man leaves one of the political parties and joins another, it is usually because he did not get something he wanted, mostly a job. Watch the camp followers of the political parties and see how vocal they often are and how silent they become once they get a job.

Political patronage, it is agreed, is a bad thing but all over the world everywhere various influences are used to get people jobs. This is just as true in the old countries as in the new. Immediately there is a desirable vacancy, candidates for the position pull every string they can think of to influence the appointment.

Some say all appointments should be made as a result of examinations. We have known people with yards of testimonials and degrees and recommendations who have proved absolute failures when appointed to responsible positions. People who get jobs as examiners are often as unfit as the candidates that come before them. The result is that the appointments are not satisfactory. As long as people are swayed by other considerations than the good of the country, the stripe of political faith will make little difference.

AGAIN WE ARE HOPING

Prime Minister Chamberlain again declares his faith in the best means of preserving the peace of Europe. That is by tying up with Germany. There are many thousands of Canadian people who do not agree with that policy. There are also many who are willing to trust Chamberlain to do what is best for the empire. In any event, the Prime Minister is in the saddle and we are all hoping his policy is the correct one for only a few more or less irresponsible fire-eaters favor war.

If Mr. Chamberlain fails there will be plenty of people to say "I told you so" and to declare they knew all the time he could not succeed. If he does succeed in keeping the Empire out of war, few will remember to admit that he was right and they were wrong.

FISH PLANT EXPANDING

Extensive Improvements and Extensions Made to Bacon Plant, Increasing Payroll and Output

Extensive improvement and modernization work has just been completed at the Bacon Fisheries plant on the government wharf at Prince Rupert. With a large increase in employment all around, the concern continues to turn out its former fresh, frozen and cured fish products together with a number of new lines on a more efficient and greatly increased basis.

One of the notable improvements at the Bacon plant is the adoption of a new air conditioned smoking process, based on the latest developments in that field of fish curing. By the installation of electric heaters and fans in the smoking chamber, a constant temperature can now be readily maintained. With the taking away of a certain amount of moisture from the fish, an improved product with better keeping qualities is insured. Hardwood sawdust is now used to produce the smoke, circulation of which is now completely regulated. The smoking plant has a capacity of 1500 pounds daily.

Another new installation at the Bacon Fisheries plant is a crab and shrimp cannery with capacity of 25 cases per day. The canned crab and shrimp output is being taken by a local wholesale concern.

In addition to the new canned product, cold pack shrimp and crab is now being turned out and is meeting with high favor with the trade. It is going on the market as Prince Rupert Sea Foods.

Still another new product is bottled cured salmon eggs, both in clusters and single, for trout bait. It is the first time that this product has been turned out in Canada, having always heretofore been imported from Seattle. Small cured shrimps in similar bottles is also produced for steelhead bait.

The concern is also working on the possibilities of producing fish pastes which are gaining popularity as sandwich spreads and in other ways.

With the winter fishing season now on, the new plant is in steady operation. Yesterday nine women were found at work in the picking and packing room getting crabs and shrimps in readiness for cold pack, canning and fresh shipment. Elsewhere in the plant five men were at work on various jobs in connection with the preparation of many fish products. B. J. Bacon, the manager, said that on some days this staff was doubled.

Twenty-five crab fishermen are working for the Bacon Fisheries. Two shrimp boats are out and all the fresh cod offered is being taken.

CANBERRA, Dec. 20 (CP)—Defence measures beyond those provided for in a three-year plan calling for expenditures of 172,000,000 are said to be under consideration by the federal cabinet and the Australian Loan Council.

Among works reported to be contemplated are a dock at Sydney large enough to accommodate a battleship, improvements to seaports and airports, construction of strategic roads, duplication of some railway lines and speeding up of munitions factories' production. Sir Earle Page, minister for commerce, has appealed for a nation effort in the interests of defence.
