Extensive Improvements and Extensions Made to Bacon Plant, Increasing Payroll and Output

ernization work has just been commer fresh, frozen and cured fish products together with a number new lines on a more efficient and greatly increased basis.

One of the notable improvements at the Bacon plant is the adoption of a new air conditioned smoking process, based on the latest developments in that field of fish curing By the installation of electric heatets and fans in the smoking chamber, a constant temperature can now be readily maintained. With amount of moisture from the fish. an improved product with better keeping qualities is insured. Hardwood sawdust is now used to produce the smoke, circulation which is now completely regulated. of 1500 pounds daily.

Another new installation at the Bacon Fisheries plant is a crab and shrimp cannery with capacity 25 cases per day. The canned crab and shrimp output is being taken by a local wholesale concern.

In addition to the new canned product, cold pack shrimp and crab is now being turned out and is meeting with high favor with the trade. It is going on the market as Prince Rupert Sea Foods.

Still another new product .12 bottled cured salmon eggs, both .50 clusters and single, for trout bait It is the first time that this pro-.00 duct has been turned out in Can-.or ada, having always heretofore been imported from Seattle. Small cur-.02 ed shrimps in similar bottles is al-25 so produced for steelhead bait.

The concern is also working on the possibilities of producing fish pastes which are gaining popularity as sandwich spreads and in other ways.
