representation, has made a valuable contribution to the art of democratic government," says John Humphreys, secretary of the Proportional Representation Society, in commenting on the June election which saw the return to power of Prime Minister Eamon de Valera's government.

Analysing the result, Mr. Humphreys says: "Mr. de Valera's par ty polled a majority of the votes. one seat for every 9,300 votes. Mr. William Cosgrave's party (Fine Gael), though defeated, will have la full share of representation, with one seat for every 9,900 votes. Labor contested many areas, but only in nine areas did its candidates poll the proportion of votes necessary to win a seat. The leaders of all three parties were returned.

What would have happened without P. R.? Labor would have returned; Fine Gael would possibly have been so reduced in numbers as to be an ineffective force. Mr. Cosgrave might have been de-
