WHIFFLETS
C.N.R. steamer Prince Rupert, Capt. James Watt, arrived in port on time at 10 o'clock this morning from Vancouver, Powell River and Ocean Falls and will sail at 4 o'clock this afternoon for Anyox and Stewart whence she will return here tomorrow evening southbound. The Prince Rupert, which brought north quite a number of tourist passengers who proceeded East on this morning's fast train, is completely booked out for the trip north from here to Anyox and Stewart and on to Vancouver by the "Know Mississippi Better" party of some 200 persons which arrived here by special train this afternoon from the East.

With a capacity passenger list consisting largely of round trip tourists, C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, arrived in port at 9 o'clock this morning from Vancouver and sailed at 11 a.m. for Skagway and other Alaska points whence she is due back here next Wednesday afternoon southbound. The vessel had 211 passengers of whom 175 were round trippers. Only one disembarked here.

With Major J. A. Motherwell, chief supervisor of fisheries, in attendance, fisheries patrol steamer Malaspina arrived in port last evening and sailed this morning in continuation of her return voyage to Vancouver. Major Motherwell has been visiting the Skeena and Naas Rivers and other fishing areas.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Delaide, Capt. Henry Anderson, is due in port at 5 o'clock this afternoon from the south and will sail at 10 p.m. on her return to Vancouver and way points.
