A continuation of this weather for a short time will create a very dangerous condition for forest fires. There has been so little rain this year that the forests are in shape for rapid spread of fire if one should start at any place.

To date the district has been very free of forest fires this year only one or two of any consequence having got started and these were soon brought under control. Another outbreak would not be so easily handled.

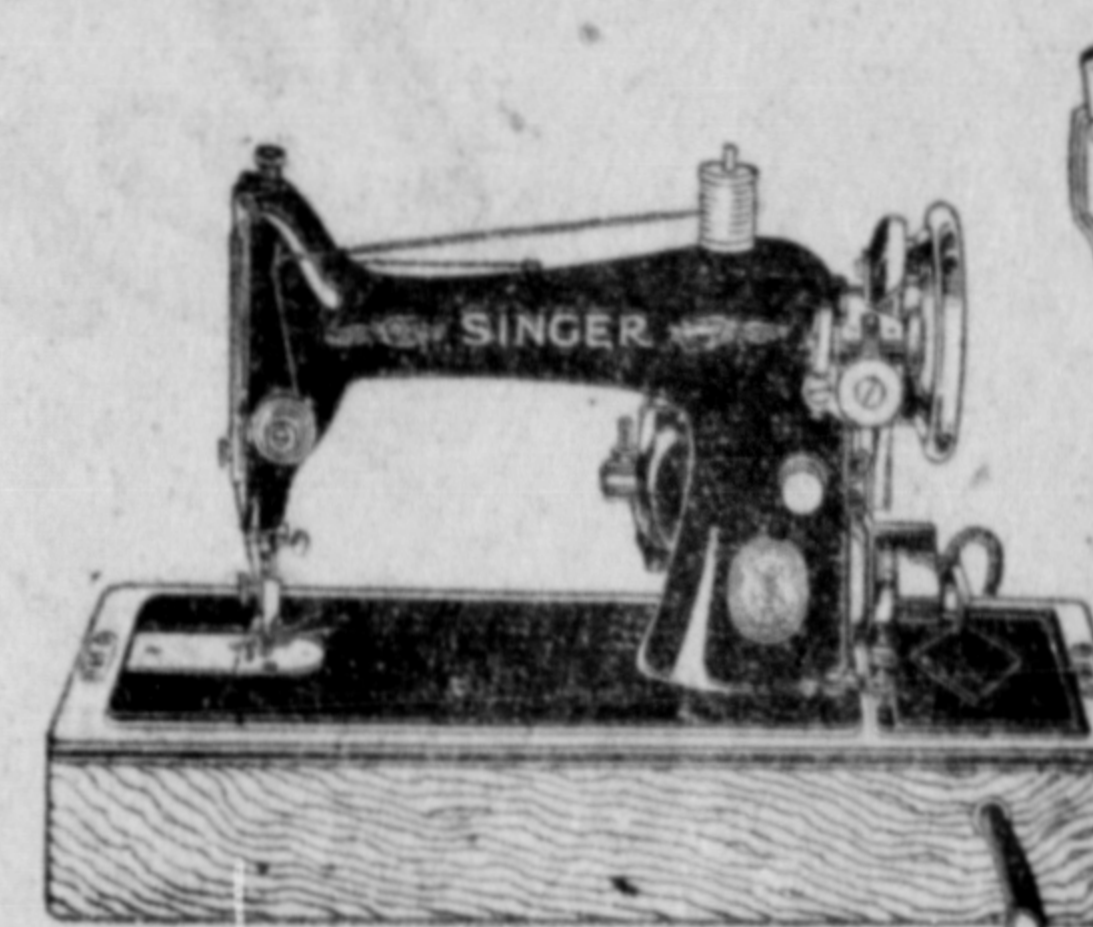
