

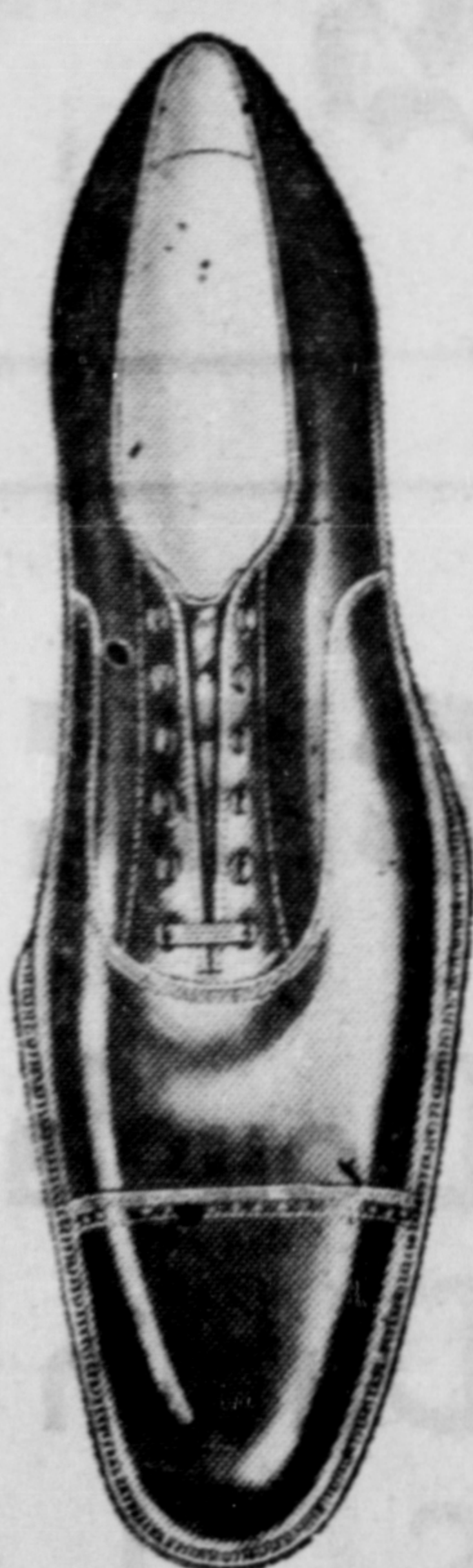

#### RIVALRY IN PAINTING

There seems to be keen rivalry in the city in the matter of painting up business premises and making them look smart and prosperous. Much has already been done and it is understood that more is planned. People whose premises are beginning to look untidy by contrast are becoming uneasy and the result should be that most of the stores will be brightened up with paint before snow falls.

#### A UNITED CANADA

The Liberal party convention in Quebec held last month was not looked upon as big news in the west but it was particularly important to the country in that its outstanding plea was for Canadian unity. Coming as it did from a convention of French Canadians when they chose a French Canadian leader, Adelard Godbout, it was an outstanding event. It is many years since a platform of unity has been so badly needed as it is today. It may also be noted that the convention went on record as favoring votes for women in the last province of the Dominion to refuse them the vote. It also favored a national scheme of unemployment insurance. Evidently there is a large section of the French-speaking people of this country that is ready to keep pace with the rest of the country and co-operate in all forward movements. Perhaps we have not been right in looking upon our fellow citizens in Quebec as conservative in their general attitude toward life. Godbout has a great opportunity to bring the province he represents into line so that the whole country may move steadily forward, keeping the Dominion well to the front among Empire Nations.

#### VISITORS INTERESTED

The visitors in the city on H. M. S. York have been interested in seeing a city such as we have at Prince Rupert. Some thought it might have been better and others evidently expected to see a wild west cow town.

May we tell these visitors that thirty years ago there was nothing here but mossy swamps and jutting rocks. The trees had been slashed off and preparations made for laying out the city. The building up process has seemed to many of us rather slow but it has really been very rapid. We have now, as the visitors are ready to admit a number of excellent shops housed in good buildings. We have a considerable number of permanent structures that would be a credit to any city. We are headquarters for a large fishing business and our waterfront is developing rapidly. Even today we have several good buildings in course of construction which will add greatly to the permanency of the city.

Visitors from older countries often look upon our efforts as crude and unfinished. We admit that there is yet much to be done in Prince Rupert. With the development of the surrounding country we expect to grow rapidly and become an important seaport designed to serve Canada and the rest of the world in connection with the channels of world trade. In the process of development there are bound to be crudities. All we ask is time and a fair field for our efforts. We hope the six-hundred visitors on the British ship will return and see us a quarter of a century from now by which time we feel sure they will not know the place.



### Dizzy Dean Wins Game

Chicago Cubs Come Through With Double Victory Over Boston Bees

CHICAGO, July 18: (CP)—The one and only Dizzy Dean came through in spectacular style on Sunday. At the crossroads of his career, the pitcher, for whom the Cubs paid \$185,000 and three players and who has been nursing a sore arm since May 3, went to the mound and hurled a brilliant four hit game to whip the Boston Bees 3 to 1 in the opener of a double bill.

Chicago won again in the night-cap four to nothing behind Bill Lee's five hit hurling. The double victory put the Cubs into third place in the National League standing ahead of Cincinnati Reds who lost a double header to Brooklyn Dodgers.

### NAVY WINS IN OPENER OF SOCCER

Fine Display of Football Ends In 5 to 3 Victory for H. M. S. York Over Prince Rupert

The first of the two game series between H. M. S. York and a Prince Rupert representative team Saturday night for the Hanson football trophy provided a splendidly contested match before the largest crowd of the season with the visitors winning by five goals to three. The game was only won in the last ten minutes, the display of the local team being very gratifying. The ship's band provided music before the game and also at intervals to the great delight of the large crowd.

In the opening exchanges, Morgan saved from Kelso and Eveleigh from McMeekin. Christison had a chance but failed to control the ball and then Gould opened the score. Bryant had an opening from McMeekin's cross but shot past weakly. Tong drove over. Christison had hard luck with a grand drive that hit the upright and Henry Dickens' hard shot was luckily blocked. At last Armstrong got the equalizer. The locals were playing a wide open game and Eveleigh had to save from Bryant and also from A. Dickens. Navy went very close but Longbone and Lakeland were just wide. Christison had a good chance but Philippott cleared.

Morgan punched away a high shot and Lakeland was too high. Prince Rupert combined cleverly to get close in until Norman came to the rescue. Longbone put the Navy ahead and, just after, Morgan fielded a terrific drive from Gould in a way that well deserved the applause it got. An error of judgment by Morgan later gave the York their third goal and play slackened off. Albert Dickens shot a second goal on a free kick from outside the penalty area and the game became livelier. Rupert threatened, both Armstrong and McMeekin going close. Eveleigh saved on the line and Armstrong got through to equalize with a good goal following a grand centre from McMeekin. Rupert should have gone ahead but Charville cleared. Then Gould added a fourth when the local defence slackened a bit and a little hesitation by Murray let Gould through in the closing minutes for the fifth and final goal.

Referee MacPherson handled the whistle in a way that showed his complete control of the game. Teams: H. M. S. Dickens; Christison; Armstrong; McMeekin. Navy Played Neatly The Navy played neater football than the locals although they are not as good as the teams the Dragon or Danae fielded. Eveleigh had no chance with any of the goals scored. He took more than four stops when clearing at times though. Norman and Philippott were two sound backs who tackled effectively. The halves were reliable with ability to feed their forwards. All the forwards showed nice ball control and their heading was good. They found the bounce a little difficult to judge at times.

For Prince Rupert Morgan was very good apart from one unlucky shot. Murray and Parsons were very safe and resourceful backs. A. Dickens turned in a fine game and was the best player on the field. Ronalds gave a display that stamped him as a classy half back. McMeekin and Armstrong were the best forwards. Christison was not as good as usual. H. Dickens played a poor game. He was out of position and gave Bryant little help. The latter did not get much chance.

Tonight's game will provide another interesting match. There are to be a few changes in the local line-up that will make them stronger. There will undoubtedly be a large attendance. The following players have been selected to represent the city this evening: Herbie Morgan; W. Murray and Parsons; L. Gillis; A. Davies and A. Ronalds; D. Cameron; Alan Smith; Albert Dickens; R. Armstrong; D. McMeekin.
