### AGREEMENT IS BLOCKED

American Rederation Would Prevent C.I.O. Sending Cannery Workers to Alaska

SEATTLE, May 23. - Under a compromise arrangement with the Alaska Packers' Association, the Committee on Industrial Organization cannery unions agreed at the week-end to dispatch workers to the Alaska salmon canneries. The American Federation of Labor, which claims jurisdiction over these workers, immediately announced that it would picket ships embarking cannery workers for Alaska. Six hundred workers were to leave.

### Oregon Has Close Race

Henry Hesse Is Winner Over Martin In Gubernatorial Primary

PORTLAND, Oregon, May 23:-With Governor Charles M. Martin and Henry Hesse running neckand-neck, the latter won on late returns in the Democratic gubernatorial primary, the vote being 66,000 to 59,000.

Metropolitan Multnomah County, as expected, gave Hesse a lead which stood at 17,497 to 17,001. Martin was expected to go ahead on returns from upstate where his policies were believed to be popular but failed to do so. Martin has been a prominent critic of President Roosevelt and the New Deal. Secretary of the Interior Ickes backed Hesse.
