THE RIGHT METHOD

There was recently a dispute between Great Britain! and the United States as to the ownership of the Canton! and Enderby Islands in the middle of the Pacific. Each. government claimed the islands belonged to it. Instead of fighting it out in the historic way, the two governments! decided that, as each needed the islands for a similar purpose, they might both use them in connection with aviation, the islands to be under a joint control.

This is an example that will probably be followed between other countries in future. There was no need to quarrel over a little matter like the ownership of a speck in the Pacific and the two countries did not quarrel. They did not even spar. They simply talked over the situation and agreed to compromise.

PEGGED WHEAT PRICE

At the first of the week we got word that the United! States would bonus export wheat from that country. A few days before that it was announced that Canada would peg the price of wheat at 80c which meant a bonus on today's market price.

Peace River farmers say the bonus is not as good as it looks because it costs them twenty-one cents to get their! wheat to Fort William. This meant that they obtained less than sixty cents for the highest grade wheat. As much of the wheat grades below number one, the price is still lower than that mentioned.

Still it is a great boon to the farmer to have the price; pegged in such a way that he can make a reasonable living. Should the market price fall to fifty cents, however, it would mean a heavy tax on the rest of the country to keep the price paid to the farmer at eighty cents. And yet the farmers are not satisfied. .

OFFICIAL SECRETS

Duncan Sandys, a member of the British Parliament, had in his possession some official secrets. He knew something about anti-aircraft guns which none but military of-! ficers were supposed to know. He was summoned before the attorney general and threatened that, if he did not re-! veal the source of his information, he would be prosecuted. Next day he arose in his place in the House of Commons and complained that he had been threatened and also that he had been summoned to appear before a military court. Parliament was aroused and so was the whole of Great Britain. The privileges of Parliament had been invaded and young Mr. Sandys became more or less of a hero. He got himself into the limelight and he also showed that official secrets were not always secret and that, if a friend could obtain those secrets, so might an enemy. There was a lot of fuss in Parliament and in the newspapers and there it seems to have ended. However the ruling powers were shown that there were certain rights and privileges in Britain that were still sacred, more sacredi even to the individual than the safety of the kingdom.
