The Prince Rupert General Hospital Association has invited tenders for the erection of a complete and fully modern 50 bed hospital of concrete construction, to be erected on the site adjoining the present hospital. These tenders are to be in the hands of the Hospital authorities not later than April 9th next and it is expected the relative contract will be awarded soon thereafter.

in abeyance it was never withdrawn. Perhaps the chief service which Mr. Scott rendered at Ottawa was the drafting of the Manitoba Grain Act, for the text of which he was largely responsible. The provisions of this act March 25 and 26, CIRCUS, for many years governed the shipment and inspection of western wheat and they have done much to give the prairie grain its present high standing in the markets of the world.

In 1905 Mr. Scott was unanimously tendered the leadership of the Liberal party in the province of Saskatchewan. In that year the first provincial election took place and the political warfare which developed was of a distinctly bitter character. He had a formidable; opponent in Mr. Haultain who for a number of years had been premier of the Northwest Territories with a record of successful administration along non - partizan lines. Haultain was passionately -Capitol Theatre, April 27 and the autonomy acts and no doubt this was the reason that Sir Wilfrid passed him over and selected Mr. Scott for the premiership. Mr. Haultain, who afterwards received knighthood and became Chief Justice of Saskatchewan, fought he campaign under the banner of Provincial Rights but the Liberal party, in receipt of substantial support from the Laurier government, triumphed at the polls and Mr. Scott was thus confirmed first premier of Saskatchewan.

With the assistance of a strong cabinet, Mr. Scott entered upon the prodigious task of guiding the des tinies of Canada's fastest-growing province. He chose for his minister of agriculture W. R. Motherwell. who later served in a similar capacity in the Dominion Parliament, while J. A. Calder was induced to leave his school inspectorate and become the first minister of education. In the following election no serious opposition was encountered The election of 1913 was fought on the reciprocity issue and, despite the fact that the Laurier administration went down to defeat on this program, the Scott government was returned with an overwhelming majority.

The regime of the government under Mr. Scott's leadership was necessarily constructive. The whole legislative fabric had to be conceived and brought into being but the province was the pioneer in many developments and innovations necessary to meet conditions hitherto unknown. The solution of the problem of co-operative marketing of wheat may be cited as an example of Mr. Scott's foresight and canniness while the successful treatment of the university



took up residence in Victoria, but two years later he returned to Sazkatchewan to take over the editor-
