### COMMUNITY PRIDE NOW

Marked Improvements in Native Villages of This District are Noted by School Superintendent

A marked improvement during the past year or so in Indian villages on this part of the coast is noted by Rev. F. A. Anfield, superintendent of the Alert Bay Indian school, who is a visitor in the city. Mr. Anfield came north in company with Capt. Gerald H. Barry, inspector of Indian Schools, and with him visited a number of the villages. Mr. Anfield will sail by the Cardena tonight on his return to Alert Bay.

Community pride and civic consciousness are gradually becoming more and more manifest in the native villages, Mr. Anfield finds. In some of the villages there has been a great deal of new home building. Notable among these villages are Bella Bella, where ten fine new houses have been built during the past, and Kitimaat, where there have been nine built. At Kitkatla and Klemtu also new homes have been built. Civic improvements in the villages have also included installation of light plants, water systems, sidewalks, etc.

There is also an improvement in the school work being carried on in the various villages, says Mr. Anfield.

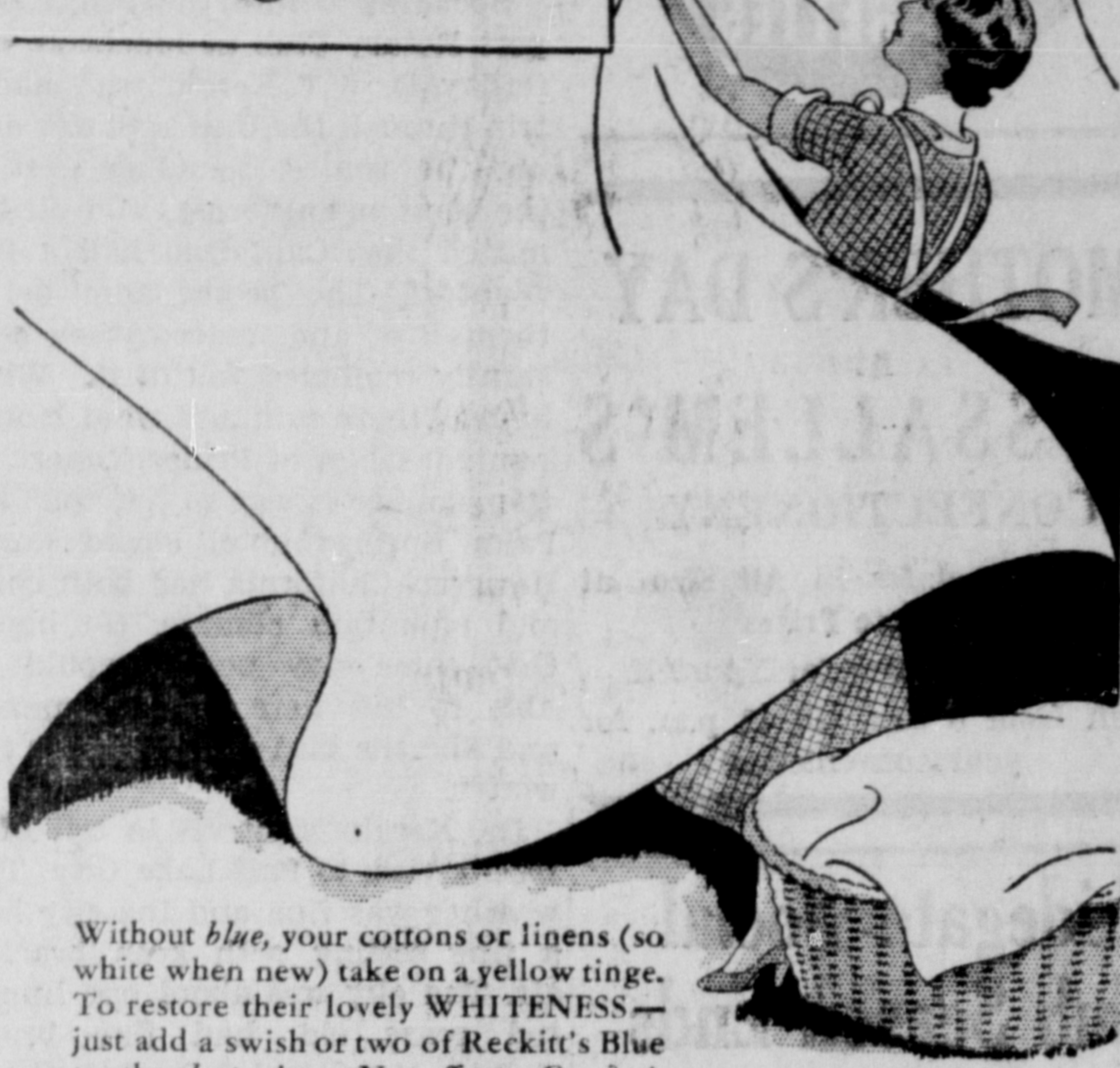
