Concession By Ottawa is Announced-Would Give Relief Until Harvest

VICTORIA, July 8: (CP)-Prem-Evanston, Illinois, and injuring ier T. D. Pattullo announced last night that a concession had been made by the federal government in extent of Mrs. Tindale's injuries regard to the problem of the single unemployed in British Columbia whereby, if they registered with the Unemployment Service of Canada, men would be given transportation back to their homes outside of the province and then extended relief until harvest time when it was expected they would be able to obtain employment.
