Off Alaska Coast-Nippon to **Punish Poachers**

(CP)-Following negotiations which have been reported under way for some time, United States and Japan last night finally settled their quarrel over Japanese salmon fishing in Alaskan waters.

Japan reassured the United States that she is suspending the threeyear salmon fishing survey started in 1936 and will not issue licenses for fishing in Alaska waters. Further, offenders will be punished.

The dispute had threatened an undeclared war between the fleets of the two countries particularly in the Bristol Bay area.

Padlock Law No Concern of Federal Government, Declares Duplessis

IS REJECTED

QUEBEC, March 26: (CP) -Claiming that the subject is no concern of the federal government, Premier Maurice Duplessis yesterday stated that the Quebec government would not be represented at a conference proposed by Hon. Ernest Lapointe, minister of justice, to consider the Quebec padlock. The conference is proposed to consider a protest by the Civil Liberties Union. Such legislation is fully within the competence of the provincial authority, asserts Duplessis.

Dominion Should Present Its Case

British Columbia Ready to Co-Operate in Settling Federal Problems, Says Pattullo

VICTORIA, March 26: (CP) -Premier T. D. Pattullo proposed yesterday that the Dominion government should present a submission to the Rowell Royal Commission on intergovernmental relations as the governments of the provinces were doing. While British Columbia had peculiar and important problems of its own, this province was ready to co-operate fully in efforts to settle Dominion problems, said the Premier.
