YANKEE VIEW OF IMMIGRATION POLICY.

Though final figures are not yet available, it is evident that the increase of population in the States by immigration in 1911 was decidedly smaller than in any recent year, except 1908, when industrial depression following the panic of the autumn before caused an actual reversal of the tide, says the Saturday Evening Post. No doubt the Italian war has both checked the movement from that country and recalled many emigrants; but to explain the total movement of last year a more general cause must be sought.

Arrivals of aliens to the date covered by the last report averages less than eighty thousand a month, while the departures of emigrant aliens reached more than half that figure. At this rate the United States would have gained not much over four hundred thousand on the year against over eight hundred thousand in 1910.

In contrast with these figures Canada shows, for the seven months ending October 1st, the largest immigration in her history. Two hundred and sixty-five thousand aliens entered the Dominion in that period, and ninety-three thousand of them crossed the border from the United States. If the States deduct that ninety-three thousand from its net gain from immigration in approximately the same period it would appear that Canada's increase of population from immigration was much larger than that of the States; but there is a considerable return flow of Canadian immigrants to the United States, of which these figures take no account.

For some time Canada has pursued a consistent and intelligent immigration policy, while the States have had no policy at all.

The Dominion seeks to attract immigrants of the sort she has most need of and to distribute them to the best advantage to themselves and to her. The Republic is only beginning to take thought of what the alien should do and how he should be treated after he gets there. It would not be surprising if Canada, with its more intelligent policy and the great resources to be developed, presently supplanted the United States as the chief goal of North American immigration.

"MAKING THE GRADE"

An Item for Pedestrians Who Use Third Avenue, Near McBride

Members of the City Council, in the apt Canadian idiom, "made the grade at the election, but the laborers who are toiling under Foreman Thompson to build the retaining wall and do the back filling on Third Avenue, between First and McBride streets won't be able to make the grade there in the literal sense so fast. There is to be a shortage of rock for the retaining wall, and fewer men can be worked on the job than formerly, as the rock comes in so slowly. Camozzi's cut is about through on Third street, and rock for this retaining wall is coming mostly from the lane in the business section. "It will be some time yet," says Foreman Thompson, "before there is a

level grade along the northerly side of Third Avenue extending between First street and McBride."
