Two Pictures At Capitol Theatre

"Of Human Hearts" and "The First Hundred Years" Give Good Entertainment

Placed in the stirring days of Lincoln, and in America's pioneer settlements in Ohio, "Of Human Hearts," the human drama of a circuit-riding preacher and his family, brings Walter Huston to the screen for the first time since his triumphs in "Dodsworth." The new picture, in which James Stewart and Beulah Bondi are teamed with Huston as his son and wife, comes to the Capitol Theatre tonight and tomorrow.

"Of Human Hearts" is based on the story "Benefits Forgot," by Honore Morrow, and deals with the struggle of beliefs between father and son and the everlasting love of a mother who worships her boy and also blindly adores the father. Dramatic highlights include the bitter quarrel between father and son, the dramatic moment in which Lincoln sets the boy's erring feet on the right path, the reunion of mother and son after the Civil War, and other dramatic moments interspersed with human interest and comedy.

The timely problem of the wife who is called upon to give up her successful career in order to make a home for her husband and who cannot bear the idea of relinquishing her business associations and background, forms the theme of "The First Hundred Years," also showing tonight and tomorrow.

Robert Montgomery plays the boat-designer husband, Virginia Bruce is his wife, a successful New York theatrical agent and Warren William plays her business partner in the film, a domestic comedy-drama which reaches its climax when Montgomery is awarded \$400 a month alimony as part of the terms of their separation.

been published in the Russian newspapers in regard to it. What has been published is that Britain and France have capitulated to capitalist Germany.

Yesterday meetings of the inner circle of the cabinet continued at intervals. The French ambassador called at Number 10 Downing Street and so did Anthony Eden, former Foreign Secretary.

It was announced yesterday that the air section of the British defences would be strengthened by enlisting the services of retired airmen to the number of about a quarter of a million. These would be an air reserve to be called up if needed.

It was reported here that an appeal had been made by the French Finance Minister to the people of France to put their money back into the banks. This money had been withdrawn as soon as it was known that a crisis had arisen.

In Austria the Roman Catholic Church negotiations with the Nazis have broken down. The Church is objecting to the suppression of Catholic schools and to the legalizing of marriages made by others than priests. Priests who are in sympathy with the Nazis have come under the ban of the Church.

C.P.R. steamer Princess Louise, Capt. S. K. Gray, is due in port at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning from Vancouver and will sail at 9 a.m. for Alaska ports.

NEW PLANES FOR CANADA

Fleet of Ten Now Complete And Ready For Service

WINNIPEG, Sept. 21.—Completing the fleet of Trans-Canada Air Lines aircraft, two new Lockheed 14's CF TCL and CF TCM winged their way from California to Vancouver late yesterday and today were expected to take off on the remaining leg of the ferry trip to Winnipeg. Their arrival boosted the number of TCA 14's to 10 and filled the order placed last year with the Lockheed factory at Burbank.

Five Electras, smaller craft of Lockheed manufacture and the first planes purchased at the airline's inception are to be sent into service over the various feeder lines connecting in both East and West with the main line routes served by the huge 14's.

H. T. Lewis, chief technical adviser in charge of flying pilots Marlowe Kennedy, Ron George and T. M. Shields of the Department of Transport were at the controls of the new machine on the north-bound flight.

Lockheed 14's are recognized among the most efficient of today's transport aircraft. Many have been purchased by European airlines and only recently the R. A. F. took delivery of the first of an order for 200. They cruise at 225 m.p.h. and have a top speed of 250. Accommodation for 10 passengers and a crew of three and the cargo capacity of 2700 pounds is the largest ever built into aircraft of the size.
