NOTICE TO MARINERS

Change in Position of Lighthouse on Ballenas Islands, Strait of Georgia.

Ballenas Islands lighthouse, Strait of Georgia, is being moved from the southerly Ballenas island to the northerly Ballenas island; and the light will be shown from the lighthouse in its new position on or after January 1st, 1912, when the maintenance of a light on the southerly island will be discontinued.

The lighthouse will stand on the summit of the north Ballenas island, 1,240 feet S. 42 E. from the fog alarm building on the north point of the same island, and 5,126 feet N. 50 W. from the old site of the lighthouse on the south island.
Latitude, N. 49 degrees 21 minutes 12 seconds. Longitude W. 124 degrees 10 minutes 11 seconds.

The lighthouse tower is an enclosed wooden building, square in plan, with sloping sides, painted white, surmounted by a square wooden lantern, painted red. The height of the tower from its base

to the top of the ventilator on the lantern is 33 feet.

The fixed white light will be elevated 280 feet above high water mark, and should be visible 14 miles from all points of approach. The illuminating apparatus is temporarily dioptric of the seventh order.

The Geographic Board of Canada has decided to adopt the name "Koya Point" for the first prominent point on Moresby Island to the eastward of Langor Point, on the north side of the eastern entrance to Houston Stewart Channel.
