Prince Rupert people, like people in other comparatively small towns or cities, sometimes are afflicted with an inferiority complex. They feel that it is a handicap to live in a small place. That's where they are wrong. It is no handicap to live in a small place. We could tell of plenty, of Prince Rupert boys who have made good in important positions. But what we wish to say here is that if any boy or girl, young man or young woman, feels an urge to try to make a name in the world, go to it. Do not be, afraid. ### CHINESE ARE IRRITATING PEOPLE

The Chinese are irritating people. They do not know when they are beaten. Most of their seaports are occupied and the great Yangtse Kiang River, the most important waterway in the country, is in the hands of the enemy. In spite of this, the Chinese seem to think they will drive the Japanese out. And they may do so.

Not so many months ago the Japanese landed an army of something like three hundred thousand men in South China and marched across to Canton. They occupied the city without resistance but since they arrived the Chinese have closed around them and it may be difficult for them to get out. Just now they are not eating as well as they could wish, according to common report. The Chinese are not proving very hospitable.

The Japanese also took Hankow and occupied it and followed the retreating Chinese even farther into the interior and since that have been driven back with considerable loss.

On Saturday we learned that the elements were fighting against the invaders, the river having overflowed and made occupation of the country difficult.

On several occasions this paper has stated that the Chinese retreat was part of a planned campaign. We are still inclined to think the war is being carried out according to the original plan and that these irritating Chinese people may yet make it hot for the invaders. In the meantime. however, the Japanese are top men and, according to all the rules of the game, the Chinese should capitulate. But will they? This is a new war and is not being fought according to western rules.

Elmore Philpott of Victoria, who addressed the Canadian Club in this city in the autumn, does not see how the Chinese can win. He argues that such a thing has never been done in the past under similar circumstances. there is always a first time for every new thing and this may be it.
