# NEED OF LOANS IN RUPERT

The federal government is planning to extend its loans to encourage new building. This will probably be done through the various loan companies operating in the large centres of population. Prince Rupert, having no loan company, is unable to take advantage of the government support. The Chamber of Commerce, representing the business and professional interests of the city, may nossibly be able to suggest how to overcome the difficulty. Possibly it may be done by forming a local loan company or by inducing some outside company to establish here. Houses are likely to be needed and, if there is any money forthcoming from the government, steps should be taken to get some of it expended in Prince Rupert.

When shipbuilding was carried on in Prince Rupert, a loan company was organized and it was a complete success. It paid dividends every year and when closed out the people who put their money in were able to get all of it
