

GARDEN NOTEBOOK

The rains last week rather daunted the spirits of the local garden enthusiasts but at that they did not suffer as badly as the bowling enthusiasts who were unable to get out at all. Gardening was good some evenings but the weeds seemed to rival the mile a minute speed of the Flying Scotsman in the rate at which they grew. Hosing is useless in wet weather but the weeds pull easily when the ground is damp.

A rather good display of the new Russell Lupins is to be seen just now in Bob Yates' garden. They are near the fence and can be seen from the street quite well. Naturally the blooms are not as large as they should be next year. There is much more variety of color than we have been used to in lupins. It is surprising how well the young plants have done in Prince Rupert. Most of those who sowed seed early have flowers or will have them soon. I should have about five in bloom in two weeks' time.

W. H. Sherman was last week the proud possessor of a fine mauve Campanula or bell flower. It stood about eight feet high and was three or four feet across, the finest example of this flower I have ever seen. It was after the rain that I saw it and it was beginning to go off but even then it was a massive clump of flowers.

There are a great many campanulas in our gardens. Some fine examples are the Canterbury Bell and the hare bell. I have a tall plant of that order that is at present in bloom about three feet high but the frost hit it badly last winter and it did not bloom very well. Next year there should be a big showing. I also have several dwarfs, white and blue, suited to the garden.

It is not too late now to sow a good many of the perennials. I notice that the foxgloves that seeded themselves last fall have a nice showing of young plants in the rough ground surrounding the garden. If they had been sown at this time in the cold frame last year they might have bloomed this year. As it is they will be fine plants next year. The seeds are in

drifts and if they all grow will be picturesque. It is quite impossible for me to visit all the gardens I would like to see but when anyone has something unusual to show I try to make a point of seeing it. The garden movement is growing beyond all possibility of a person trying to keep in touch with all of it all the time. One has to do a little gardening at home occasionally.

Today we are publishing the prize list for the annual show to be held on the last Monday in this month. This is the last day on which two tourist boats are expected to be in town. It is not yet decided where the show will be held but it will probably be in one of the vacant stores in the city, preferably on Third Avenue. If the loan of a store can be secured, this is probably the only time the prize list will be published. It would be well to cut it out and keep it until show day.

The Horticultural Society is fortunate in having Professor Buck as judge for the occasion and also for the judging of the gardens. One advantage of entering a garden will be that the owner may have the advantage of Professor Buck's criticism and helpful suggestions. Several people have benefited from what Professor Bars told them last year but, of course the judge of this year may have different ideas of what a garden should be. Last year's judge insisted that no gardener could expect to win unless he had a lawn. It may be different this year.

British Vessels May Be Searched

OTTAWA, August 8.—Canadian preventive forces have been given the right to search vessels of British registry within twelve miles of Canadian shores under an agreement between the United Kingdom and Ottawa. This step was taken primarily to forestall liquor smuggling.

GREY OWL WAS WHITE

Former Wife Tells Origin Of Legend Naturalist Was Indian

WINNIPEG, August 8.—(CP)—Origin of the legend that Grey Owl, famed wild life conservationist, author and lecturer, was a full-blooded Indian was disclosed here by a young Mohawk woman, once known as Mrs. Grey Owl and now travelling to England as Mrs. Gertrude Bernard.

Name of the naturalist who died last spring was really Archie Belaney and he was a white man, she said. Belief he was an Indian started when he was asked to speak at a meeting of the Ottawa Field Naturalists' Association. Belaney was then gaining notice as a naturalist, writer on woodland life and champion of Canadian beaver.

He went to the meeting deeply tanned and dressed in buckskins. Before he realized what had happened the chairman introduced him as an Indian. Belaney liked the idea, bought a new outfit of buckskins and let his hair grow long. The public did the rest.

"No matter what the people thought he was," said Mrs. Bernard, "he gave the world some wonderful writings. The fact he was a white man and an Englishman should have made him all the more remarkable."

"When he went to England on his first lecture tour I personally beaded the clothing he took with him. He was very fond of color and his costumes were designed to make a striking figure."

"I am afraid I did not like all the publicity and notice which always accompanied Archie wherever he went. He wanted me to go with him but I could not have enjoyed the ceremony and attention accompanying a trip like that. After all, Archie was a showman and he never profited materially from a rumor which the public chose to work into a national mystery."

Asked her opinion as to the defence of the second Mrs. Grey Owl, maintaining Grey Owl was an Indian, Mrs. Bernard said: "She probably did think he was an Indian. Archie probably never told her the truth about himself."

Mrs. Bernard said her Indian name was Paharomen Nahareo, or Flaming Leaf, and that she was born the daughter of Mohawk parents.
