of revenue. Our credit has been re-established and our bonds sell to yield as low a return as some of the larger cities in British Columbia.

Looking For Relief

"Unfortunately, we have problems to face. Land assessments have fallen as people everywhere are holding only what they can improve and the few remaining taxpayers cannot pay another additional cent. They are looking for some relief which will not come as long as social service and an expensive educational system are a charge on their property. The tubercular patients at Tranquille and the Vancouver branch cost the city last month \$395 and relief cost one hundred dollars more than last year on account of the physically unfit becoming a city charge.

"The fire department, which has been in the limelight demanding increased pay, cost the city last year \$880 for wages and a total expense of \$11,692. There were 47 calls during the year, including false alarms so that each call cost \$247.

"Our waterworks system has arrived at a point that is almost a collapse on various avenues in Section Five and Six. Penny wise and pound foolish wooden pipes were used and must now be replaced. Fortunately, the Dominion government is loaning money for such purposes when guaranteed by the Provincial government at two per cent and two per cent on principal to be paid each year for thirty years but only for self-liquidating purposes. Our water department has always been in the red on account of the very low rates to residents. Last year we were in the red \$2,200 in spite of the advance in 1934 so that another increase in rates will be necessary to put it on a paying basis and take care of the interest of two per cent and amortization of the loan.

"The future can be looked forward to with confidence if we keep our expenses within our income. Industries will come when the world settles down to business again. Meanwhile we are fortunate at being situated where much government money will be spent right away. Mines are springing up at our doors and timber industries must develop. The city is quietly making progress. In 1934 the telephone numbers 1320, against 1393 today. Water connections in 1934 were 1489 and 1721 today. School children were 992 and 1067 today. It is up to the citizens of the future to look after the personality and credit of the city."



Prince Rupert and Queen Charlotte Islands—Moderate to fresh, shifting to east. Mostly fair and a little colder.


West Coast of Vancouver Island—Moderate northwest winds shifting to southwest. Fair and cold with frost at night.
