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#### ABSURD INTERFERENCE

The suggestion that Germany did not approve Prime Minister Chamberlain giving a public address on Britain's foreign policy was an arrogant assumption of authority which that country does not possess. On a previous occasion exception had been taken to the views of British statesmen. This also was beyond the right of one nation in its dealings with another.

Canadian people will be glad to see Prime Minister Chamberlain stiffening his back and letting the world know that the British Empire, while striving for peace, will not be averse to defending its rights.

#### SITUATION IN CHINA

Japan has come to the danger period in her campaign against China. It is the period where she feels that she has extended herself to the limit and must either consolidate her position or withdraw. She has not been able to consolidate very well because she has lost the ground gained in Hunan province.

While no one can deny the great advantage of controlling the important seaports, that in itself is not sufficient. The moment Japan begins to withdraw from the interior, she begins to lose prestige. If she cannot hold what she has taken she is showing weakness.

#### ABERHART WEARY

Many people will agree with Premier Aberhart that it is about time he retired. He has not been an outstanding success. He set out to introduce Social Credit into the province of Alberta but so far has not done so. He has ruined the credit of the province temporarily at least and has given nothing to take its place. We see every reason why Mr. Aberhart should resign at once and no good reason why he should continue in office. His constituents, however, may hold different views.

#### THE LEADERSHIP

In a democratic country we do not quite like to have opposition to a leader spoken of as a conspiracy. There is no reason why any person in the country should not oppose any leader without being accused of plotting. At the present time Right Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King is Prime Minister of Canada but that does not presuppose that he has any right to look upon the position as a life job. He is kept there by the vote of the people and is supposed to represent the whole country. As such any person has a right to take exception to the manner in which he has carried out his duties. In a country like Germany it would be treason to try to replace him but in Canada it is just a natural process of government. That is the difference between a democracy and a dictatorship.

In Prince Rupert there are a number of Liberals who do not look upon Mr. King with any enthusiasm because he has not shown that outstanding leadership that they would like to see. He seems to have taken the line of least resistance. The people who feel that way are not conspirators. They simply express their natural reactions to the administration.

## TO UNVEIL MEMORIAL

Royal Ceremony at Ottawa to be Conducted By King

OTTAWA, Dec. 14 (CP)—In the most pretentious square of this Canadian capital, against a background of the stately government buildings which adorn Parliament Hill, Canada's national Great War Memorial will be unveiled next May by King George VI.

The structure is an arch, about 70 feet high, surmounted by the symbolic figures of Peace and Freedom. Marching through the arch are 22 other figures, representing every branch of war service. They leave behind them an unimpaired cannon—and all that it stands for.

Work on the memorial has been in progress for 10 years; but only this year was it transported from London to Ottawa and erected in

the hub of the city. Some years ago, the memorial was put together temporarily in Hyde Park, London, and there admired as a chaste and dignified product of the famous War brothers of Kent, England.

The story of the memorial began in 1925 when Vernon March, youngest of seven brothers of a Yorkshire farming family, won the Canadian government's competition for a design. All seven were artistically inclined, with Sydney, the second son, and Vernon taking the lead in sculpturing. Already they had achieved international renown.

#### Designer Died

The Canadian competition stipulated that the design should not feature war, but should rather honor Canada's response to the Motherland. Vernon March's plan was one of seven among 1000 submitted and it won in the final elimination when models were called for. Vernon March died in 1937, but his brothers carried on.

This year the whole downtown district of Ottawa is being remodelled in conformity with a civic beautification plan evolved by M.

## PUNISH PEEPERS

Head of Society Thinks the Sentence Would Cure Them

LONDON, Dec. 14 (CP)—Dr. Norman Haire, president of the Sex Education Society, has a new cure for Peeping Toms and persons given to exhibitionism—send them to nudist camps.

Dr. Haire declared: "Since there are quite a lot of people, far more than you hear of in the papers who have these desires, I think it would be a very good thing to impose sentences of regular attendance at nudist camps. It would have a very good effect on their abnormalities."

However, at the conference Dr. Haire headed, Hugh Shaylor who answered the question "Why are we nudists?" said: "The initial impulse toward nudism is very largely sexual curiosity or, in a lesser degree, sexual exhibitionism."

Mrs. Denise Bedingfield, who

spoke of "Nudism in Practice" told the conference: "In the light of my own experience of over seven years I have discovered that the sexual side of nudism is really of the least importance."

"Real nudists do not go for sexual excitement because they know it does not achieve their purpose. We have a membership of 500 people and it is very difficult for me to imagine there can be sufficient sexual interest in the mere sight of other people without their clothes to maintain that at fever pitch in the same people over seven years." William Welby said many who knew nothing of the nudist movement appeared to be impressed by its sexual aspect and added: "Some of them we know join nudist clubs for the purpose of observing sexual characteristics of others. I think it is particularly desirable that children should be brought up without false shame."
