## FAVOR FOR VOLUNTEERS

British Public Opinion Opposed to Conscription

LONDON, Nov. 5: (CP)-A slight margin in favor of voluntary reresult of a London Daily Mail poll. There were 102,644 votes— 51,511 favoring the voluntary system and 51,133 favoring conscription, giving a majority of 378 to the voluntary

Recalling that the poll was started during the European crisis over Czechoslovakia, Viscount Rothermere's newspaper explained the results as follows: "On the first day, while tension was at its height, voting in favor of compulsory service was almost six to one. As the war ouds grew lighter, so public opinion veered. And at the end votes Premier Chamberlain and Foreign in favor of compulsory service and voluntary service became almost

**Evacuation of Cities** 

Meanwhile a government-endorsed report on the evacuation of civilians in time of emergency suggested such evacuation from large cities should not be obligatory. The report, which hinted at creation of a national register of the country's war potential, was accompanied by a memorandum signed by Home Secretary Sir Samuel Hoare in which the government endorsed the report's recommendations.
