Waterfront Whiffs

Conference of Representatives from Various Coast Ports on Fishing Curtailment to be Held Here—Manager of New Oil Company Arrives

With a view to reaching a general agreement upon a curtailment plan for the coming year in the interests of fish conservation and price stabilization, a conference of representatives of halibut boat owners and fishermen from various ports on the Pacific Coast is being arranged to take place in Prince Rupert not earlier than February 16. Deciding that more along this line could be accomplished by personal contact than by correspondence, the Canadian Halibut Vessel Owners' Association of Prince Rupert conceived the idea of the conference. Seattle and Ketchikan boat owners and fishermen have already endorsed the plan and will be represented with delegates. Vancouver, Petersburg and Juneau have also been invited to be represented.

Towards the end of this week herring have again been running in the harbor in sufficient quantities to permit of sealing operations for the Tucks Inlet at Port Edward reduction plants. Following the settlement of the seiners' strike at the first of the week, there was little success in sealing but, with the arrival of cooler weather Thursday, the run improved and for the past couple of days good catches have been made.

Motorship Norco arrived in port at 11:30 last night from Ketchikan with three carloads of mild cured salmon for transshipment East over Canadian National Railways after discharging which she sailed for Seattle.

A notice to mariners issued by the Department of Transport announces a number of uncharted rocks off the east coast of Queen Charlotte Islands in vicinity of Tanu and Lyell Islands.

To assume the management of the newly established local branch of the Standard Oil Co. of British Columbia, M. C. Brock arrived in the city on the Princess Adelaide yesterday afternoon from Vancouver. He will be joined later by Mrs. Brock and family. E. A. Bence of the Standard Oil sales department also arrived from Vancouver on the Princess Adelaide. The company's new plant on the local waterfront is now nearing completion.

C. C. Kuechel of Adelaide, Australia, who is at present stationed at the Prince Rupert Fisheries Experimental Station carrying out special research work for the Australian government, returned to the city on the Princess Adelaide yesterday afternoon after making a brief trip to Vancouver.

Squadron Leader E. L. MacLeod of Victoria and D. H. McLean, air engineer, arrived here at 4:30 yesterday afternoon from Vancouver with a Royal Canadian Air Force Fairchild seaplane and will be in Prince Rupert for the next few weeks. They left Vancouver at 10 o'clock yesterday morning.

Woman Promoter Suggests Britons Help Nations With More Bathing

WELLINGTON, Shropshire, Eng. Jan. 29. (CP)—Declaring the average Englishman took about 20 baths a year, Mrs. Eileen Murphy representing the British Commercial Gas Association, told the National Union of Townswomen's Guilds here if Britons bathed daily national prosperity would increase with the use of more bathtubs, soap and fuel.

Thomas Walsh Commissioner

Only One Nomination for Vacancy on Terrace Board

TERRACE, Jan. 29:—The municipal election resulted in one nomination only, that being T.H. Walsh. Mr. Walsh was, therefore, elected by acclamation and will hold office as one of the Village Commissioners for the next three years. Mr. Walsh has had previous experience as a Commissioner of Terrace.

The Commissioners constituting the Board of Terrace Village Corporation are Gordon Temple, E. Haugland and T. H. Walsh. Each holds office for a period of three years, one retiring each year as in the case of school trustees.

A slight change has recently been made in the sections dealing with the election of village commissioners. The time for holding elections has been advanced one month. Therefore, the next election will be, not in January, but in December.

Queries Future Of Young Folks

Australian Say Women Smoke and Drink Too Much

MELBOURNE, Australia, Jan. 29: (CP)—Sir John Harris, Victoria Minister of Health, wonders what young people are coming to. He made some pointed remarks in addressing a deputation of Australian women who made a number of requests and asked that smoking in restaurants be restricted.

"Women are smoking and drinking too much," Sir John said. "They began in war-time to keep up with the soldiers' darlings—the nurses. What the young people are coming to I do not know."

The health minister declared that in his experience as a medical man he had seen sad results follow the advice of doctors to women to drink beer.

He agreed with the view of members of the deputation that smoking at meal-times was objectionable but he could not see that it was harmful from a health point of view.
