PRESERVE MONASTERY

The financial statement for the year, presented by W. M. Brown chairman of the finance committee, revealed an excess of revenue over expenditure for 1937 of \$785.47. The building extension fund amounted to \$21,819 face value or \$20,456.79 after discount of city of Prince Rupert bonds. During the year membership fees collected had amounted to \$705 as compared with \$55 in the year previous. The cost per hospital day for the year had been \$257. Mr. Brown presented a list of improvements and new items of equipment which had been paid out of revenue during the last thirteen years, this totalling some \$18,000. This had been done in spite of the fact that there had been no special grants from any source.

This completed the presentation of reports and the business of election of the 1938 board was immediately proceeded with. Owing to the size of the attendance the distribution and collection of ballots and the counting of same took up considerable time and it was about 10:30 before the meeting ended after George L. Rorie had been re-appointed auditor.

Elected to the 1938 board were G. P. Tinker, F. A. MacCallum, W. M. Brown, G. V. Wilkinson and Frank Dibb. Mr. MacCallum sat on last year's board as a representative.


