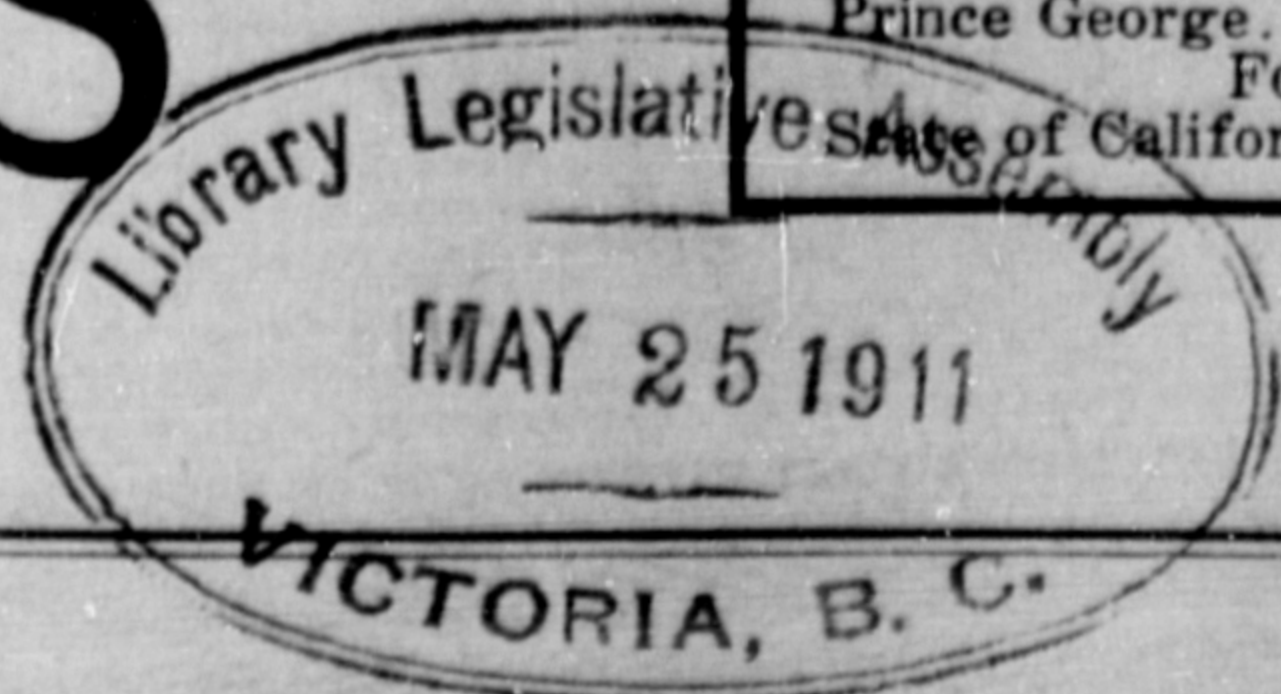

GENERAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE AUTUMN

ADJOURNED THE HOUSE  
TILL MIDDLE OF JULY

Supplementary Estimates of \$34,000,000 Given Royal Assent---Members May Now Go Home---Reciprocity First Item for New House

(Canadian Press Despatch)

Ottawa, May 20.—After attending the Senate in a body, where Mr. Charles Fitzpatrick as deputy governor-General gave the Royal assent to the supply bill for \$34,000,000 and several other bills which had passed their third reading, the House of Commons ceased work shortly before ten o'clock last night.

**Reciprocity in June**

Before the House formally adjourned till after the Coronation, Mr. R. L. Borden asked when the question of reciprocity with the United States would be taken up. Hon. W. S. Fielding, who in the absence of Sir Wilfrid Laurier is acting as Leader of the Government, replied that it was the intention of the Government to take up the question immediately upon the House re-assembling on July 18th.

PROVINCE WILL BUILD A  
JAIL-FARM AT BURNABY

Tenders Were Called For To-Day—Will Have But One Central Prison for Whole Province

(Canadian Press Despatch)

Vancouver, May 20.—The first move for the systematic re-organization of the prison system of the Province was made this morning when tenders were called for the construction of a prison farm to be located at Burnaby. This is the beginning of a series of improvements to relieve the overcrowding of the provincial jails.

**Will Raise Food-crops**

The plans provide for one large central prison for the Province with large lands surrounding it. Two hundred acres will be given over to farming. The farm will be worked by the prisoners, who will be set to work raising the essential food-stuffs.

**Marks an Advance**

The new system of farm-work has worked well in other places, and it is here believed it will work more good for the prisoners, and more economically for the province than the old method of putting the prisoners to work on unpleasant and confining occupations.

A little while ago the group included also all the royal children of Italy, but they were taken back home by their parents to be present at the Italian Jubilee celebrations.

The two little Hesse princes are the children of Grand Duke Ernest of Hesse, one of the greatest royal houses of the German Empire, and the Princesses Margaria and Theodora of Greece, are the children of Prince and Princess Andreas, the latter of whom was a Battenberg, and is esteemed one of the loveliest princesses of Europe.

DIVER AT WORK ON NEW  
GOVERNMENT WHARF

Interesting Spectacle at the Foot of McBride Street--Under-water Blasting is Killing All Sorts of Fish---Preparing Foundation for the New Concrete Piles.

A diver is now busily at work preparing foundations for the concrete piles of the new Government Wharf. Blasting operations are being carried on beneath the water, and the firing of the shots is causing consternation and havoc among the finny population down there.

All sorts and conditions of fish big and little, eatable and uneatable are killed by the concussion in the water when the explosions occur, and their bodies float up to the surface. It is only necessary then to dip them out with a sweep net. The rumor that some of the fish are also cooked by the blast is not to be taken seriously. We have wonderful fishing in Prince Rupert Harbor, but not so wonderful as all that.

Progress on the Government wharf will be greatly expedited by the employment of the diver. The work of construction has been going on with steadiness if not speed, recently, and the engineers have had several difficulties to contend with which could only be conquered by patient effort. Plenty of strong re-inforced concrete piles are ready to place in position. The machinery for placing them is there. The difficulty has been to get the foundation right.

TRAIL FROM TUCK'S INLET  
CLEAR TO PORT SIMPSON

Mr. W. Wright Has Surveyed the Road for the Government---The People of Prince Rupert Will Soon be Able to Walk There In From Five to Six Hours

A new trail has been surveyed, and will soon be opened up from the head of Tuck's Inlet to Port Simpson via Georgetown, a distance altogether of about twelve miles. This trail will make possible a series of easily accomplished excursions for residents of Prince Rupert, and is acceptable news. The trail runs for some distance beside the route of the new railway to Port Simpson.

Mr. W. Wright, the surveyor attached to the Government Public Works Department, has already made a survey of the route which lies on good bench land all the way. The trail can be constructed without any tremendous outlay, and the work will certainly be started very shortly. The distance from the head of Tuck's Inlet to Georgetown is 3 1-2 miles, from there to Port Simpson 7 1-2.

This distance can be covered over the trail in about five or six hours. Formerly the old-timers here used to go from Metlakatla to Simpson by way of the coast, in about seven hours.

Mr. Wright is now in Kitsumkalum arranging for the trail to be constructed between that point and the Naas. It is the intention of the Government to do a great deal of work in these districts this season, and new trails will be opened up in as many directions as may be necessary for the development of the centres opening up just now.

VANCOUVER GIRL  
FATALLY BURNED

Miss Nellie Hogg is the Victim of a Pot of Boiling Wax

The unfortunate girl was busy in the kitchen, when a pot of wax on the stove boiled over and burst into flames. In attempting to put out the flames, some of the burning substance caught on her clothes, which became ignited. She was hastened to the hospital but without avail.

CANADA'S PREMIER GOT  
A ROYAL RECEPTION

Lord Mayor and Council of Liverpool Tendered a Civic Reception—Royal Train, Decorated With Flowers, Placed At His Disposal for Trip to London

London, May 20.—The affection which the people of Great Britain hold for Sir Wilfrid Laurier was shown on his arrival at Liverpool yesterday afternoon. The Lord Mayor and the City Council, attired in their robes of office, with the stage coach in waiting, received the Canadian Premier as he stepped off the Virginian.

**Royal Train Waiting**

The London & North-Western Railway placed at his disposal the saloon cars of the Royal train, which was decorated with flowers for the occasion. Crowds of people gathered at the boat side and gave a popular expression of their welcome.

**Politics Avoided**

At the civic reception, Sir Wilfrid delivered a graceful speech, avoiding all reference to politics. Interviewers who saw him later were received by Sir Wilfrid, but he firmly refused to be interviewed on political topics.

ASK FOR LINE INTO THE  
PEACE RIVER COUNTRY

Vancouver Merchants Hold a Meeting—Want Province to Build or Assist in Building.

Vancouver, May 20.—The need of providing a railway from the coast cities into Northern British Columbia and the Peace River country was emphasized last night at a large meeting of the business men of Vancouver called for the purpose of discussing question of railway service.

**Passed a Resolution**

The meeting finally passed a resolution urging the Provincial Government to provide or to assist in providing a railway into the Peace River country from the coast cities.

**A Wealthy District**

It was pointed out that the Peace River district when settled will become one of the wealthiest portions of the province, and that the building of a railway would greatly help the work of settling this rich district.
