Digger Stanley, the English bantamweight, is out of the game with a broken hand.

Fern, the late Lincoln City goalie, recently transferred to Everton, is said to be of Irish birth, and comes from County Tyrone.

At present Willie O'Hagan (St. Mirren) is favorite for the position of custodian in the Irish team vs. Wales, but if Fern is eligible there may be opposition.

A Nottingham dental firm is presenting each of the Notts county players with a black evonite ring, with a white tooth setting, as a mascot for the cup tie.

Dumbarton football club has been incorporated with a share capital of \$20,000. Each member will be allotted two \$5 shares, with \$3 each share paid up.

Len Turnbull, the speedy home player of the Salmonbellies, has accepted the proposition offered him by the Victoria club, while Micky Ions and Sibby Nichols are also certain. Efforts will be made to secure other lacrosse stars to complete a strong squad.

The British Olympic committee has decided to make another appeal for a fund of \$200,000 to

provide effective representation at the Olympic games to be held at Berlin in 1916. Recently the Duke of Westminster's Olympic fund committee, which aspired to raise \$200,000 through a national collection, has failed in its purpose.

The Torontos and Canadiens are now tied for the National Hockey association championship and it will take the last night of the season to determine who will meet Victoria, western champions, for the Stanley cup.

Tommy Dunderdale, the clever goal getter of the Victoria hockey team, was married in Victoria last week.

Quite a sensation was caused after the recent Scottish cup tie between Glasgow Celtic and Clyde when it became known that Dods, the Celtic left back, was taken seriously ill after the game. The nature of the illness is not so serious as at first expected and it is hoped that the popular back will be able to take his place for Scotland against Ireland a week from today.

Chances are that Portland will have a hockey team next year.

Lester Patrick says the Victoria hockey team cannot fail to bring back the world's title.

Kid Kenneth, the young California heavyweight, who recently knocked out Pelkey, is hot after a match with Jess Willard. Kenneth has nine straight knockouts to his credit.

The King will offer a cup for the international yacht race to be held during the Panama Pacific exposition at San Francisco in 1915.

Sportsmen of the old country are highly elated over the reconciliation, after a seven years' feud, of the Football association and the Amateur Football association.

Richard Cavill, the Australian swimmer who was the first man to swim the Golden Gate at San Francisco, and who was recognized as the champion swimmer of the world from 1895 to 1900, died of exhaustion soon after he had been taken from the water after an unsuccessful attempt to swim across the Seattle harbor, a distance of three miles.

"Packey" McFarland will not retire from the boxing game until after he has made a trip to Australia. He has agreed to go to the land of the Kangaroo in June.

PRO. LACROSSE CLUB ASSURED FOR CAPITAL

Mayor Stewart Chosen President of New Club—Three-team League on Coast

With one of the strongest arrays of officers that any local club ever boasted of, Victoria's professional lacrosse club came into being at the meeting this week. A franchise has been taken up in the British Columbia Lacrosse association and immediate steps will be taken to secure a charter for the club. Manager Harry Pickering has taken a position in Victoria and is busy getting a team together, and as there is unlimited capital behind him the task should not be a hard one.

The following men are now either signed up or have given the Victoria club options on their services for this season: Boss Johnson, Johnny Howard, Joe Dakers, Micky Ions, Harry Pickering, Sibby Nichols, Joe Gorman, Len Turnbull, Hugh Gifford, Cotton Brynjolfsson, Stan Okell, Ran McDonald and several others. With a manager like Pickering to whip these men into shape, the Victoria team should be one of the greatest in the entire Dominion.

The election of an executive committee was deferred for a few weeks, but the following were elected: Patrons, his honor Lieutenant-governor Paterson, and the Hon. Mr. Justice Gallihier; honorary president, Sir Richard McBride; president, Mayor Stewart; vice-president, Ald. Okell; secretary-treasurer, Lester Patrick; manager, Harry Pickering. An executive committee will be elected later.

The players will work on a profit-sharing basis, and positions will be secured for the men who come to the capital from outside points. It is just possible that several eastern players will also come to the coast.

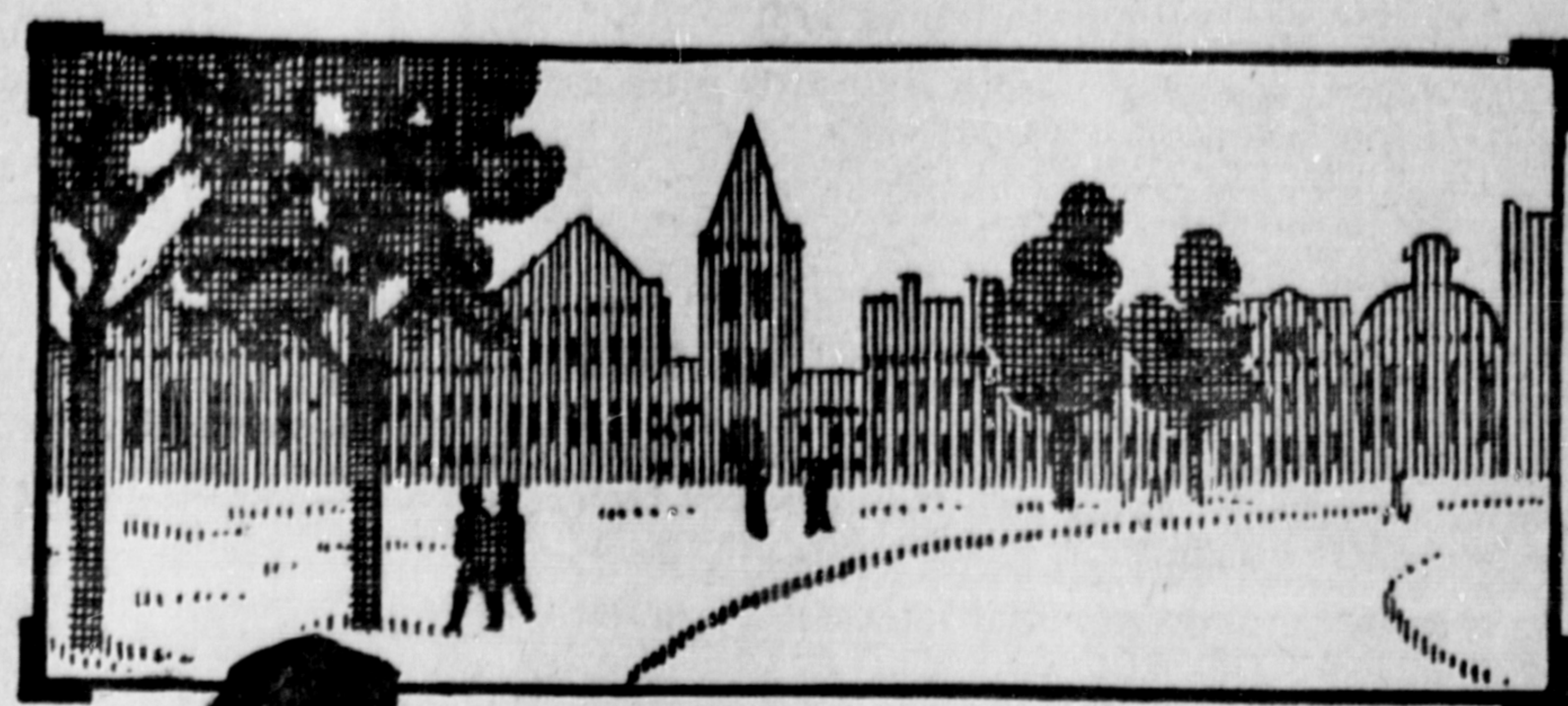
