

### OBJECTIONABLE FEATURE

The post offices of Canada carry out work which is very objectionable to many of their patrons. They allow mail to be delivered to them in bulk as advertising matter and distribute it among the boxes, cluttering them up and wasting the time of the businessman who is already overburdened with "dead" mail.

We have received numerous complaints of this habit. Many of the people who receive this class of advertising simply throw it on the floor in the post office and make the place untidy. It is a pity that so useful an institution as a post office should prostitute itself to such a purpose.

### HON. HEWITT BOSTOCK

### MEANING OF BRITISH

Canada is a British country and so is Australia and so is Scotland and so is England but Canada is not Britain, whereas Scotland is. For years Scottish people have objected to the word English, used to represent Great Britain but still the word is used, especially by foreign nations who almost always use the word England when mentioning the British nation.

A newspaper writer has this to say against the use of the word Britain:

"Judged by its sound, its power, its behavior in a sentence, it is a poor word. We always use it with a sensation of reluctance; there is no imagination in it; no fire; no tumult or exaltation; no living throb of the heart; no storm or tempest; no triumphs through the centuries. Whereas all these and clarions and trumpets and harbors and ships as well, are in "England." "England" is one of the great words of the language; a greater word than "Rome," whose booming grandeur has something fatal and pitiless in it; a greater word than "Greece," which echoes the fragmentary beauty of a lost age. To our ear a greater word than "France," which has a perfectly superb crashing power, and affects the mind like a streaming banner. "England" is a word we like to use, and even with constitutional accuracy frowning at us, we give it often the right-of-way

"We do not expect this reason, of course, to receive much favor from the sticklers for "Britain." ### Moon Vines and Morning Glories

With the snowy bloom of the moon-flowers opening with startling suddenness at dusk and the brilliant display of morning glories in the early hours of the day a back porch may be made a thing of beauty and an all-summer joy by planting these vines. From a common old plant the morning glory has become an aristocrat through the introduction of beautiful Japanese types which by the skill of the Japanese are even grown as dwarf exhibition plants.

The Japanese morning glories are not as easy growers as the oldtime vines which spring up everyfore planting.

In their variety of form and coloring, fringing and doubling, they offer a fascinating study.

The moonflowers may be purchased as growing plants and thus grown from seed easily. They make an astonishingly rapid growth once they get going and must be given worth it. plenty of support. 
