UNDER CIVIL SERVICE REGULATIONS.

The Federal Civil Service Commissioners have issued an interesting report which shows that the departments are finding some difficulty in obtaining qualified applicants for vacant positions. This fact shows the great change that has come over the inside civil service of Canada since the system of competitive examination for admission was introduced. Formerly there were more people looking for jobs in the civil service than there were places to be filled. Ministers and members of Parliament were pestered and pursued by people of all ages seeking clerkships, and the change seems to mean that qualifications based on party service of applicants and their friends are more common than those based on education and fitness. Even for the third or lowest division, members of which are not in the line of promotion to responsible positions, and are required to pass but easy examinations, the list of candidates is not inadequate. But in the second division, for which the examination covers higher academic subjects, the field is much smaller.

The Commissioners are of the opinion that the salary of \$800 which is paid at the beginning to those who enter the second division is too low to attract university graduates. They suggest that it should be raised to \$1,000 after six months to those who stand well in the competitive examinations, and receive a favorable report after six months in the service. As it is, a large number of temporary appointments have to be made for want of a sufficient number who have passed the examinations. In November, 1910, there were only 42 candidates examined for the second division, while there were 188 for the third. Of the 42 only 21 and of the 188 only 50 were successful. Last May only 60 wrote for the second division and 35 passed, while 228 wrote for the third division, of whom 93 passed. Many special examinations were held to fill positions requiring technical or scientific knowledge and experience.

Bullets of a Variety That Will Cost a Thousand Dollars Each to Fire, Standing the Height of a Man.

Here's the shell destined to defend the Panama Canal. It represents the kind of bullets that the big 16-inch rifle of the



American coast defense service shoots. This five-foot armor piercing shell is the biggest in the world. It weighs 2,400 pounds, and has a range of over 20 miles. It costs Uncle Sam \$1,000 every time one of these big fellows is fired.

FLYNN VS. WILLIAMS

White Hope Wins from Dusky Fighter

In Toronto the other night Jim Flynn, aspirant for Jack Johnson's honors, knocked out Al Williams, of Cleveland, in the second round of a scheduled fifteen round battle. Flynn was in great form and convinced the 2000 spectators that he has at least an even chance with the dusky champion. A left hook followed by a short right uppercut to the jaw proved the final of a fast match.

Flynn started in to mix matters right from the start. He kept well covered and none of Williams' blows landed where they did any damage. On the other hand Flynn put over telling blows every time there was an opening. Just before the bell in the opening round Flynn had Williams groggy, and at the bell Williams struggled to his feet after a clean knockdown. In the second round Flynn steadied himself on the advice of Tommy Ryan, who for the first time was behind his new charge. Ryan said after the battle that Flynn already showed he had enough to assure him he was not a dead one.

ALASKA VOLCANO ACTIVE

Pavlof, Burning Mountain of the North, Belches Stones.

Seward, Jan. 29.—Pavlof volcano, on the Alaskan peninsula, west of the Shumagin Islands, is in violent eruption. Andrew Grosswald, a storekeeper at Sand Point, sixty miles from Pavlof, sends word that stones can be seen hurled from the crater and that lava and smoke are issuing.

Pavlof emits smoke even in its mildest moods and is accounted the most active of the Alaskan volcanoes. G. A. Lee, lighthouse keeper at Cape Sarichef, the most westerly point of Unimak Island, Bering Sea, reports violent earthquakes in the Aleutian Islands.

Mount Shishaldin, the most spectacular of the volcanoes, which is on Unimak Island, slumbered last summer, as also did the eccentric Bogoslof.

It is announced that the new Canadian five and ten dollar gold coins will be issued in February. They will be given a hearty welcome, and the freedom of the city on arrival in Rupert.

The Emperor of China is said to be preparing to move to Jehol. That is not quite the way the place he was consigned to by the rebels is spelled in English.
