are beyond the reach of a church. Miss Hasell and her helpers visit the outlying homesteads, hold simple services and Sunday-Schools, and recruit members for the Sunday-School-by-Post, by which means the children, as well as their parents, learn something of religion. A serious aspect of the problem is revealed by the fact that the Bolsheviks are far more zealous in their anti-religious campaign than we are as a whole in our religious campaign. Miss Hasell and her fellow workers are doing their utmost to fight these influences, and in the doing of it encounter all manner of dangerous strange and unforeseen experiences

In Peace River

"In one of her books, Miss Hasell remarks casually that one August the Mission had to visit 6,000 people in the Peace River Block covering 10,000 square miles, and that their road, which lay through a bog, was in such a condition that it had taken a man they knew 36 hours to cover four miles. Miss Hasell merely remarks, 'The road certainly was bad,'—nothing more. The lives of the settlers are often, cruelly hard, especially for the women, and for those families who have come from the Old Country and who have therefore been accustomed to a far easier and more sheltered life than is possible in the Great North-West. One of her stories, picked at random out of many, by reason of its extreme simplicity, reveals the contrast between the life of hardship lived in many instances by farmer folk overseas with the life led in the British Isles.

"We went to see a man and his wife," she writes, "who came from London 20 years ago. They had never been visited by a clergyman or had had a service. Through hard times and poverty, loneliness and the loss of two children when the shack was burnt some years ago, they lost their faith. We taught their children and put them on the Sunday-School-by-Post; they had never been taught about God. I asked a friend of mine in Canada to write to the mother and cheer her up, which she did, and sent her clothes for herself and her children. The family were quite different when we saw them again. The mother told us how she had gone to a concert of glee singers and said, 'I had not been anywhere for 14 years, and I could not have gone unless your friend had given me those nice clothes. It was like old days when I went to Westminster Abbey; how I did enjoy it.'"
