## MUCH FISH IS ARRIVING HERE

Buyers at Exchange Yesterday Afternoon Bought Four Cars Loads for Available Freezers

Four carloads of halibut, was bought at the Fish Exchange yesterday afternoon to fill the four refrigerator cars available for eastern shipment and today seventeen vessels with 171,000 pounds of fish are holding over awaiting the arrival of seven cars reported for arrival tonight and six due tomorrow night.

## WATER ACT, 1914.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that His Honour the Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia by and with the advice of His Executive Council has been pleased to order:

That pursuant to the provisions of section 59 of the Water Act 1914 and of the Statutes of 1914 that the reserve of the unrecorded waters of Bear Lake, McMullin Creek and Salmon River in the Prince Rupert Water District established by Order-in-Council numbered 948 approved on the 14th day of December, 1910, be cancelled in so far as the said reserve pertains to the water of Bear Lake, McMullin Creek and Salmon River in the Prince Rupert Water District and that notice of such cancellation be published for three months in the B. C. Gazette and for three months in one issue each month of some newspaper published in the Prince Rupert Water District.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
