CITY CALLS FOR  
ESTIMATE TO BUILD  
CONNECTING ROAD

The city council at last night's meeting decided to instruct the city engineer, through the board of works, to prepare an estimate for the cost of the road to connect the city up with the proposed provincial government road to Galloway Rapids. There was a recommendation from the board of works for the construction of the road from Eighth Avenue along Frederick Street to the Prince Rupert Boulevard and thence to Canada Avenue, the boundary of Section 8, leaving with the council the option of deciding whether the city road should terminate there or continue to the city limits through Section 9 which has not yet been offered to the public. It was the general opinion of the aldermen in council that the road would not fulfil its purpose if ending at the Section 8 boundary so it was decided to call for the estimate to the city limits.

If it is decided to build the road it will likely be paid for by the city as a whole.
