Why be Cynical
And Suspicious?

Why are Prince Rupert people so cynical and suspicious? With a few notable exceptions nothing good can come out of Prince Rupert. The citizens will not recognize local ability. There is always something wrong with local effort. No matter what line of endeavor is considered, outsiders are looked on with more favor than local people. Outside business places are better places at which to buy and everything outside is better than it is here.

As a matter of fact Prince Rupert has some of the finest people, the cleverest artists, the keenest businessmen, and the best women there are in the country. There are few places that compare with this in the personnel of its citizens. The worst sin committed by the people here, however, is that of not recognizing the merits of their fellows and of failing to appreciate efforts for the public benefit. There is a feeling of suspicion which makes people draw back from those who try to do anything. Instead of rallying round they draw back and look coldly in every project, seeing political advantage or personal gain in everything.

On Saturday there was a bad snowstorm in Southern Alberta. That is where they get the climate. Sunny Alberta is a fine place to live but they have their set backs and their disagreeable times, just as we do in Prince Rupert and everywhere else. Here we never hardly get any thunder or lightning, no mosquitoes, no horribly hot days when it is impossible to work or sleep. As a matter of fact we have about as good a time here as anywhere on the continent.

WHEAT SHIPPED
THROUGH STATESOnly 24 per cent of Product Goes
Out of Canadian Ports.

WINNIPEG, April 25.—In the half year which ended with February last less than 24 per cent of Canada's exports of wheat to overseas countries was shipped direct through Canadian ocean ports. Of the total export business to all countries about seventy per cent was done from Western Canada. These are striking statements from an article in the Grain Trade News, a daily market paper issued in Winnipeg, which gives details of the exports of wheat from this country during the six months from September 1, 1920, to February 28, 1921.

The article says: If the figures for the Canadian ocean ports are picked out of the general list it is found that the direct exports of Canadian wheat to overseas countries from our own ports for the six months totalled only 14,936,022 bushels. These are the revised official figures.

Vancouver, 466,328 bushels; Montreal, 11,943,564 bushels; St. John, 2,484,544 bushels; Quebec, 41,186 bushels; North Sydney, 100 bushels.

These are very small shipments from eastern Canadian ports and it will be noted that no shipment at all is reported from Halifax. Less than 24 per cent of Canada's exports of wheat to overseas countries was shipped direct through Canadian ocean ports.

This is below the average percentage and may perhaps be partly accounted for by the fact that an unusually large proportion of our wheat exports during these months was destined to central and southern European countries for which there was finer accommodation at United States ports. Tabulated, the figures are as follows:

Exports from Canadian ocean ports—Vancouver, 466,328 bushels; Montreal, 11,943,564; Quebec 41,186; St. John, 2,484,544, and North Sydney 100 bushels. Total from Canadian ocean ports, 14,936,022 bushels.
