TOMMY BURNS WAS NOT KNOCKED OUT

Letter Tells of Fierce Battle at Sydney When Johnson Gained Heavyweight Title.

The following letter has been received at the Daily News office: In an article of Saturday last you state that the gloves with which Jack Johnson knocked out Tommy Burns at Sydney, Australia, are in this city. I would respectfully submit that this is impossible for in the classic words of the down east Yankee, "There ain't no sich gloves."

In that fierce battle of December 26, 1908, Tommy Burns was not knocked out. He was not even knocked down after the second round.

The mill was stopped in the fourteenth ostensibly to save Burns further punishment but Tommy was still on his feet and gamely fighting.

Furthermore, sporting authorities agree that in case of police interference, no decision should be given. So Johnson cannot be credited with a knockout in that event.

I do not doubt, however, that the gloves used in that contest are in possession of the club mentioned.
