## BOARD OF TRADE ELECTS PRESIDENT

drew attention was the Tsimpsean hydro electric power system, which he foretold would prove one of the greatest benefits to the city. One of the first questions asked by outsiders interested in industries was what about power now, so that when they needed it the company could not hold citizens by the nose.

As shown by the report of the business done by the railway during the year, the volume of its short operation was absolutely startling. What would it be when completed? The Canadian Fish Company's great plant would soon be in operation; there was a concern at Haysport, twenty-seven miles away, spending a couple of millions on a plant; there was the Sir George Doughty enterprise of a million and a quarter just starting and several others he knew of that were ripe for public announcement. Other matters Mr. Mobley touched upon were insurance rates, a wagon road around the townsite, particularly giving access to Porpoise harbor, and a small debts court.

Mr. Morris called attention to the urgent need of better mail and transportation facilities for Bella Coola and a resolution was passed that the attention of the postal authorities should at once be called to the matter.

There was a long discussion on the urgent need of advertising the city and many valuable suggestions were made. Ultimately a committee was appointed consisting of Messrs. H. F. McRae, M. J. Hobin and J. H. Pillsbury to report to the first meeting of the council of the Board next Monday evening.

The petition of property holders asking the City Council to maintain the promises of the old Council in regard to the contract work and labor employed on the hydro electric scheme was introduced by Mr. Patmore, and a resolution passed endorsing it and appointing a committee to assist in its presentation to the City Council.

Two resolutions, one urging upon the Provincial Government to place on the market its lots in Sections 1, 2, 5, 6, 7 and 8, and the other for a wagon road around Kaien Island, were ordered to be sent by wire last evening.

### BATTLE IN CHINA

Imperial Army in Full Retreat—Four Hundred Killed.

(Special to Daily News.)  
Shanghai, Jan. 30.—An Imperial army of ten thousand men was decisively defeated by the Canton Republican army under General Wong Ching, yesterday. Four hundred Manchus were killed and the Imperial army is in full retreat.

## ITALY SEIZES TURKISH BOAT

Built by Celebrated English Firm and Not Yet Delivered—British Government Wires Italy for Explanation.

Hodeida, Jan. 30.—A launch belonging to Thorneycroft Bros. built for the Turkish Government, but not delivered, was seized by the Italian cruiser Biemonte. The Consul has appealed to Great Britain to take instant action as the vessel was flying the British flag. The Consul also states that the lives of foreigners are in danger through threatened bombardment. It is understood that London has cabled Rome for an explanation.
