Sam Oleson Made \$466.74 in Four Days from Sale of 100 Springs

Sam Oleson, a salmon fisherman with a small trolling boat, brought in a fine lot of spring salmon yesterday which averaged over 29 lbs. to the fish. The whole catch of 100 salmon weighing 2,919 lbs. For these he was paid 16c. a pound, or a lump sum of \$466.74 for four days work, an average of \$116.68 a day for the time he was out. Where the fish was caught Mr. Oleson was not telling as he doubtless is anxious to try the same spot again. The fish were a very fine lot and were purchased by the Royal Fish Co. by private sale.

SERVING TO SAVE.

ALTHOUGH we, as a people, are not so devoted to our stomachs as are some other nations, nevertheless, we like to be considered good providers and are satisfied only with a plentifully supplied table. The consequence is that often they are overloaded with good things, while sometimes the details are given too little attention. In this we differ greatly from our friends on the other side of the water. There, it is not considered good form to have too many varieties at a time, but however few the articles may be, care is bestowed upon their preparation and service, the special accompaniment of each dish is never missing. Boiled mutton, for instance, is never seen without mashed turnips and capersauce. Chicken must have red currant jelly. Roast beef, grated horseradish. Boiled Spanish mackerel, steamed gooseberries. Birds of game, preserved babykins. Wild duck, black current jelly. Boiled fish, a dish of boiled rice and salad. Roast pork apple sauce with apple pudding for dessert. Cold tomatoes, spinach and mushroom sauce. Roast lamb, green peas and mint sauce. Cold birds, potatoes and the like, are served on toast with a garnishing of watercress.

MODISH IDEAS

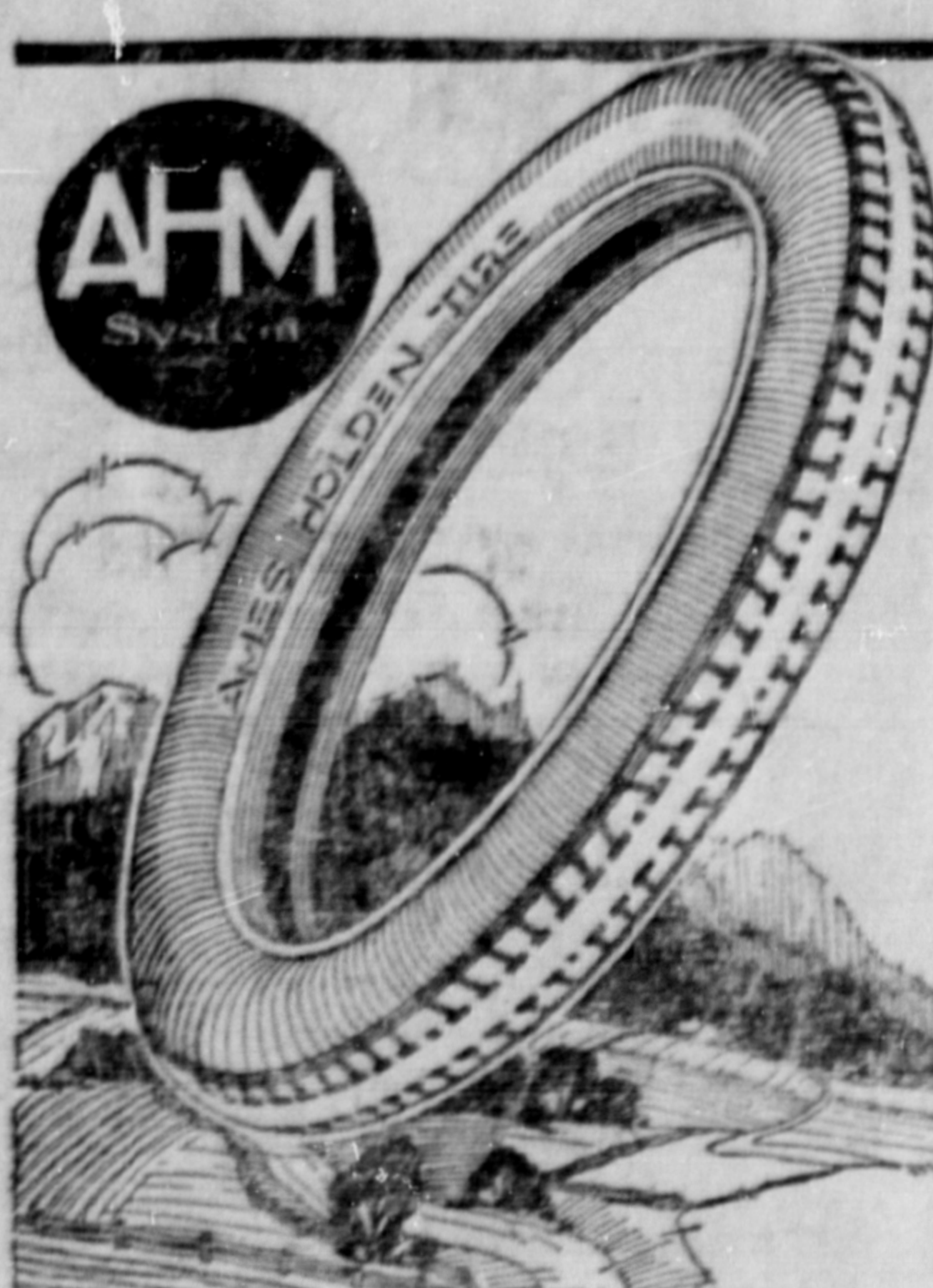
For tailored and street frocks, long tight sleeves and snug shoulders are popular. Suits and coats of elaborate fabrics are featured in place of fur trimmed models. There are new elastic bandeaux which are without straps and which flatten the bust. Long loop-petals which cover the knee start at the line of the shallow knee hole. Panels of royal blue lace are featured on a black velvet dress in draped Pinks. A short hat worn by a woman who knows how to dress is made of black patent leather of a fine thin quality, with tiny colored wooden beads sewed on at regular intervals all over its surface.

CULINARY KINKS.

Burn a stick of hard wood to bright red coals, take from stove and cool; for every two quarts of syrup add one cup of the charcoal and boil quickly for fifteen minutes and strain through thin cloth to remove particles of charcoal. This will not color the syrup, but will remove the mouldy taste and make your syrup taste like new. When in a hurry for potatoes to bake they will be done much sooner if placed in the oven dry. Plan to have them washed ahead of time and dried, or if not very muddy they may be rubbed clean with a dry cloth. When cream is not the best whipping cream, add the white of an egg to each pint and as the egg begins to whip it carries the cream with it. Cream is not considered whipping cream under twenty-four hours after setting.

SEWING TIPS.

In making knee dresses use the selvedge instead of binding. A slip or petticoat on a yoke can be adjusted to several lengths by making the shoulder straps three or four inches long and sewing snaps on at intervals of one inch on the straps. Then your girl's slip fits all her dresses.

NOTE BOOK ITEMS.

Cookies should be put in a cloth-lined stone jar if you would keep them melting and crumbly. Nothing makes better wash cloths than white stockings cut open. Double if you wish heavier ones. Crochet edging is much in vogue. If you have a very nice rug that has been soiled, it is better for its health, as well as for the cheerful aspect of the room. An excellent cleaner and polish for furniture is steel wool, grade No. 1, which can be purchased at most any hardware store. It is almost indispensable for work in the kitchen, cleaning kettles, pans, tinware, kettles, sink, &c. removes grease and rust from pots and pans of any nature. It is also excellent in the bathroom for cleaning fixtures, basins, bowl tub, &c.

ONE SHOULD KNOW.

Heavy salads make a meal by themselves. Egg yolk in warm water removes coffee stains. Pacifiers cause adenoids and disfigure mouths. Borax is excellent to use for house-cleaning. New tinware should be rubbed with lard and baked before using. A long handled button hook is useful to remove lint from the outlets of laundry tubs.

LARD PAILS.

Lard pails of various sizes labeled with the name of the contents painted in white are better than glass jars because not breakable. Wash the pail first in boiling water, then in lukewarm water and ammonia. Dry in the oven. A tube of black-white paint is used for writing the contents on the pails. Fine for keeping beans, rice, meat, etc. The 10-gallon pails are excellent for keeping crackers, doughnuts, cookies, etc.

TIMELY TIPS.

If one wishes chicken dressing to be savory, add a little sage and onion. If it is necessary to keep beef for a time, immerse it in sour milk. An excellent furniture cleaner can be made by adding one tablespoon of turpentine and three tablespoons of linseed oil to one quart of boiling water. When frying anything in boiling fat, if a piece of bread is put in the pan it prevents it burning and keeps the fat at the same heat. With a pin prick holes in eggs to be boiled and this will prevent the shells from cracking.

CUT MARSHMALLOW.

A reader recently found a way to cut marshmallows into tiny pieces without having them stick to the scissors. She dips her scissors into very cold water—preferably ice-cold—and uses them without drying. It is possible to cut six or eight marshmallows without again dipping the scissors. The work may be done very rapidly, as the marshmallows do not stick to the scissors.
