WATER ACT, 1914.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT HIS Honour the Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia by and with the advice of His Executive Council has been pleased to order:

That pursuant to the provisions of Section 59 of the Water Act 1914 being chapter 81 of the Statutes of 1914 that the reserves of the uninclosed waters of the Lake, Marmot Creek and Marmot River in the Prince Rupert Water District established by Order-in-Council numbered 948 approved on the 14th day of December, 1910, be cancelled in so far as the same are situated in the Lake and the Marmot River in the Prince Rupert Water District and that notice of such cancellation be published for three months in the B. C. Gazette and for three months in one issue each month of some newspaper published in the Prince Rupert Water District.

LAND ACT.

Notice of Intention to Apply to Purchase Land.

In Skeena Land District, Recording District of Coast, Range 5, and situate at head of Union Bay, adjoining lot 199.

Take notice that Norman R. Brodhurst, of Prince Rupert, occupation master mariner, intends to apply for permission to purchase the following described lands:

Commencing at a post planted on the south line of lot 199, thence east 20 chains; thence south 20° chains; thence west 20 chains to shore; thence along shore to point containing forty acres, more or less.

BOLSHEVIKS USE POLITICAL METHODS WITH WORKINGMEN

TERIJKI, Finland, May 4.—Copies of Bolshevik posters designed to quiet the strikers of Petrograd during the recent revolution at Kronstadt which have been brought across the border here, show the Communists turned to soft words in their effort to win over the workingmen.

Previous posters were couched in words of command, but these were addressed to "Dear Comrades" and were full of promises. One of them reads:

"Dear Comrade: We offer you the following seven concessions:

"Eighteen million pounds (or 36,07 pounds each) of coal have been ordered from abroad.

"Non-party representation will be allowed on the grain trade commissions.

"Preparations for city vegetable gardens are under way.

"Country workers will be dismissed and sent home from Petrograd because of the short rations."

"Cheek" detachments on the railways are ordered to exempt workingmen. (The "cheek" detachments were communist guards who seized any produce brought from the country into Petrograd).

"Sixty new trains will be operated to the suburbs for workingmen.

"Unlimited requisition of grain will be replaced by the definite quota system.

"Hunger only becomes greater through revolution."

Synopsis of Land Act Amendments

Minimum price of first-class land reduced to \$5 an acre; second-class to \$2.50 an acre.

Pre-emption now confined to surveyed lands only.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes and which is non-timber land.

But parties of not more than four may apply for adjacent pre-emptions with joint residence, but such making necessary improvements on respective claims.

Pre-emptors must occupy claims for five years and make improvements to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivation of at least 5 acres before receiving Crown Grant.

Where pre-emptor in occupation not less than a year, and has made proportionate improvements, he may, because of illness, etc., apply for a granted intermediate certificate of improvement and transfer his claim.

Records without permanent residence may be issued provided applicant makes an annual payment of \$300 per annum and records same each year. Failure to make improvements or record same will operate as forfeiture. Title cannot be obtained in less than 10 years. Improvements of \$100 per acre, including 5 acres cleared and cultivated, and residence of at least 2 years are required.

Pre-emptor holding Crown grant may receive another pre-emption if he requires land in conjunction with his farm, without actual occupation, provided statutory improvements made and residence maintained on Crown granted land.

An unsurveyed area, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homestead title to be obtained after fulfilling residential and improvement conditions.

For grazing and industrial purposes areas exceeding \$40 acres may be leased by any person or company.

Mill, factory or similar places on timber land not exceeding 40 acres may be purchased; conditions include payment of stumpage.

New hay meadows, inaccessible by existing roads, may be purchased conditional upon construction of road to them. Rebate of one-half of cost of road, not exceeding half of purchase price, is made.

PRE-EMPTORS' FREE GRANTS ACT.

The scope of this Act is enlarged to include all persons joining and serving with His Majesty's Forces. The time within which a homestead or devisees of a deceased pre-emptor may apply for title under this Act is extended from one year from the death of such person, as formerly, until one year after the conclusion of the present war. This privilege is also made retrospective.

Fee relating to pre-emptions are due or payable by soldiers on pre-emption recorded after June 24, 1918. Taxes are computed for 10 years.

Provision for return of money accrued, due and been paid since August 4, 1914, on account of payments, fees or taxes on soldiers' pre-emptions.

Individual agreements to purchase town or city lots will be made by members of Allied Forces, or dependents acquired direct or indirect, remitted from entitlement to March 21, 1920.

SUB-PURCHASERS OF CROWN LANDS.

Provision made for issuance of Crown grants to sub-purchasers of Crown lands, acquiring rights from persons who fail to complete purchase, involving forfeiture or fulfillment of conditions of purchase, interest and taxes. Where sub-purchasers do not claim whole of original parcel, the original price due and taxes may be distributed proportionately over whole areas. Applications must be made by May 1, 1920.

GRAZING.

Grazing Act, 1918, for systematic development of livestock industry provides for grazing districts and range administration under Commissioner. Annual grazing permits issued based on numbers ranged; priority for establishment of ranges others may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits to settlers, campers or travellers up to two head.
