Banquet Tendered American Representative on Returning to Berlin-Leak Denied at Washington.

Berlin, Jan. 8.—American Ambassador Gerard is hailed through out Germany as the dove of peace. High German officials gave a banquet here on Saturday in honor of the American Ambassador and marking his return to Berlin from Washington.

Responding to an address, Mr. Gerard said that never since the beginning of the war have relations between Germany and the United States been so cordial as they are now.
