Being Trained By Suffering Reverse.

Perhaps it is well that the American troops should know something of what it means to suffer reverses. Apparently they met with stubborn resistance to the north of Verdun and had to retire before superior forces although they have come back with fine elasticity and are just as fresh and ready as ever.

There were days when the British and French and Belgians and Italians had their bad times. That was the sort of thing that showed the calibre of the men. They held on with splendid tenacity and were always ready to strike when the opportunity occurred.

Since that they have had their opportunities and have risen to the occasion. The help of the American troops has been splendid and together they have been able to do effective work.

President Wilson's Clever Message.

There can be no peace negotiations with the people who disregard treaties and speak of the record of solemn obligations as scraps of paper. President Wilson spoke in the only language which the Huns can understand when he announced that already two million Americans had left the shores of this continent to take part in the big fight. No other message would have any effect.

President Wilson has a happy way of doing things. Had Roosevelt been sending that message he would have included it as a threat in the official communication to the Kaiser. Wilson does it in a more effective manner. He ignores the Kaiser, in so far as the threat is concerned, but the announcement being made coincidental with the message to the Huns had the effect without the form of a threat. More than that it was shorn of all bombast and must have gone right home. There was not even a suggestion of what would follow. It was a statement of fact at an opportune moment.

Boys are Still Over There Fighting.

When the fine young Canadians went away there was great enthusiasm and everyone was anxious to show appreciation of their loyalty by sending them parcels of tobacco, candies and other suitable supplies. It is over four years since they went away. Some have "gone west," while others have taken their places. Enthusiasm has waned somewhat and there is not that intense eagerness to remember the boys "over there."

Christmas will be here soon and the men will look for their mail and wonder if the people at home have forgotten them. Last year they did that and the parcels arrived weeks after they were due. To make sure of the parcels getting there on time they should be sent early. The postmaster suggests on or before November 9, but even earlier than that is proper if the men are far removed from the centre of things.

Messages from the front seem to intimate that the boys fancy the people at home are not backing them up as they should. This coming Christmas will be a good time to rid their minds of any such idea. Prince Rupert will do great things when it comes to buying Victory Bonds and this smaller thing must not be neglected.

Team Work Needed for Few Days

While the people of Prince Rupert, in common with the people in almost every part of the world, are being sorely tried just now it must not be forgotten that the men at the front have been in much more difficult situations than confront us and they have come through with colors flying.

With courage we must all face the issue and keep cheerful. By helping our neighbors we can best help ourselves. Team work and community work is the order of the day.

It must not be forgotten that in spite of our difficulties here it will be necessary for us to continue our preparations for providing money for the men at the front. Victory bonds will be on sale commencing October 28 and we shall all have to do our best when the sale opens, even though we have needs of our own to supply.

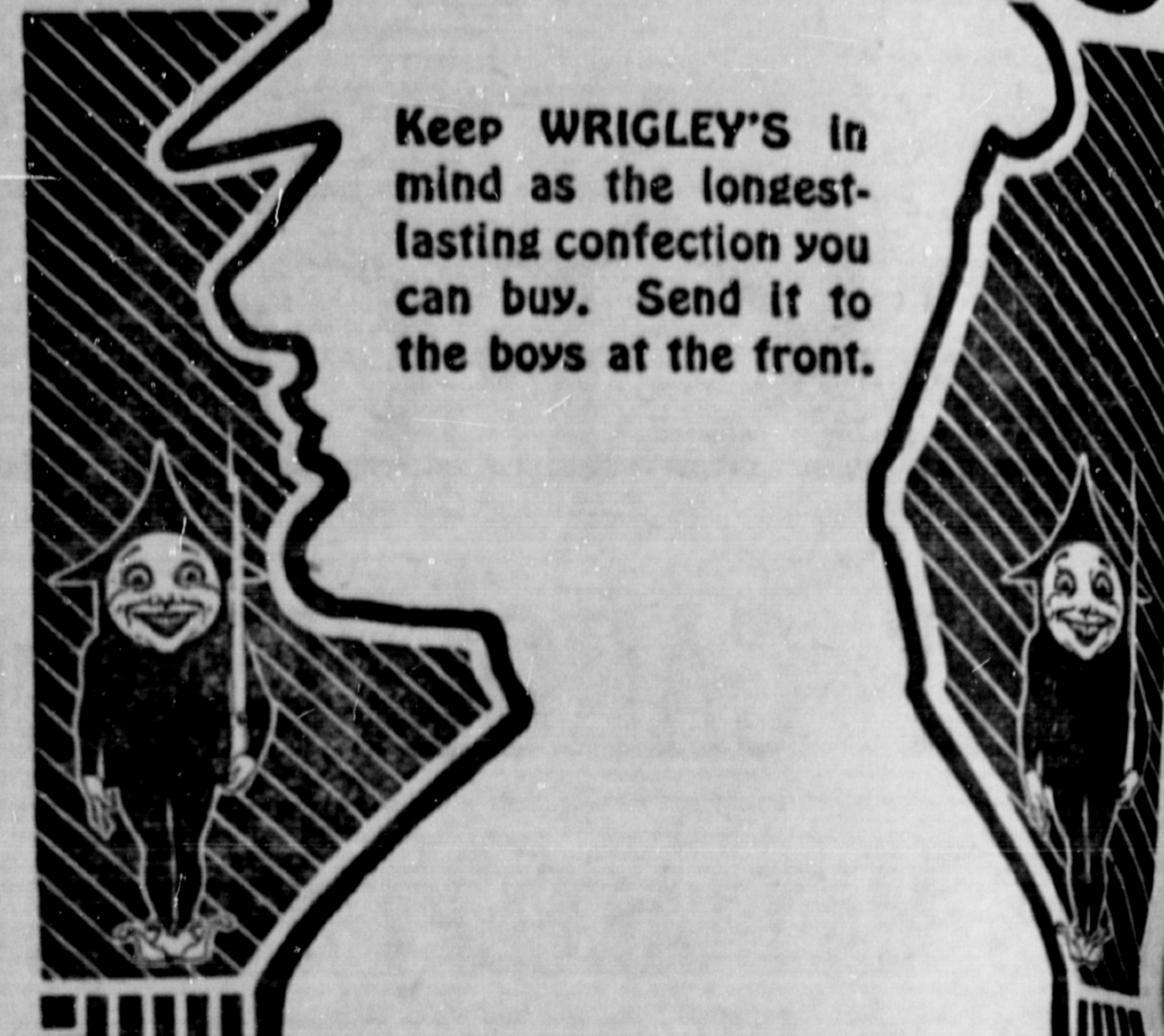
