Left Here Short Time Ago With Her Parents to Reside in Terminal City.

The many friends of Miss Nora Brand, who left here recently with her parents to reside in Vancouver, will be grieved to hear of her death there. Few details have been received in town, as the information was conveyed in a telegram requesting that her brother-in-law, Mr. Bert Wearmouth, be notified of the occurrence.

Miss Brand was for a long time a member of the telephone exchange staff in Prince Rupert, and was very popular during her stay here.

Her father, E. C. Brand, was formerly engineer at the Imperial Oil Company's plant in this city and he and Mrs. Brand recently removed to Vancouver and were living at 2728 Seventh Avenue, West, in that city. A sister of the deceased is the wife of Capt. Wearmouth.

**Local News Notes**

E. M. Haynes, inspector of port offices, was among the passengers sailing for Victoria last evening.

The funeral service for Miss Camillas McKinnon was held this morning in the Catholic Church, the Rev. Father McGrath officiating.

J. E. Umbach, surveyor-general for the Provincial Government, sailed last evening for Victoria, after visiting the land settlement areas in the Bulkley Valley.

Pat Daly, of Stewart, who has been in town for the last few days, sailed last evening for Vancouver. He is one of the old timers of the north country.

Black Jack McDonnell's Hotel at New Hazelton is being used as an emergency hospital to take care of the flu cases. Black Jack himself is one of the patients.

Miss Agnes Grant, of the Forestry Department here, returned to the city last evening from her home at Hazelton, where she has been spending the last few days.

Many people were pleased to see Ben Self again on the street yesterday after a somewhat severe attack of influenza. J. C. Gavigan was also out again attending to business.

The S. S. Prince Rupert which went north to Skagway to fetch a number of passengers who were stranded on their way out from Dawson has reached Vancouver and is expected to arrive here tomorrow as usual.

On account of the ravages of the influenza epidemic, the Seal Cove sawmill has been obliged to close down. Not sufficient men are available to carry on, and until they get better and are fit for work again, the mill will stay closed.

The Dominion Government has decided not to postpone the Victory Loan campaign which will commence on Tuesday of next week. Little is being done locally however on account of the influenza epidemic. By next week things may look different.

It having come to the knowledge of the city health department that many people have been ill and unable to call in friends or neighbors it is requested that anyone knowing of such cases will at once notify the police or the City Hall authorities so that investigation may be made. Even rumors will be investigated.

The death took place this morning at the General Hospital of Mrs. George Walters, a native of Russia. The home was at 92 Hays Cove Circle. Previous to her death a daughter was born and is doing well. There is also one other child. As in another similar case influenza was well developed before she entered the hospital on October 23.

George H. Arnott of the Prince Rupert Table Supply Co., went south two weeks ago on a business trip and was taken with influenza at Vancouver. Fortunately he was at his home there and was well looked after. Mrs. Arnott was intending to go last night but she got word that he was much improved and would be coming north on the next boat.

**BOMBARDIER WELLS MAY BOX DEMPSEY**

London, Oct. 23.—Jack Dempsey, the foremost American heavyweight since Willard has given up the ring, will be matched with Bombardier Wells, champion of England, if a bout now being arranged does not fall through. The contest, as planned, will take place in London this coming winter.

Boxing never has been so popular as it is today in London. The National Sporting Club weekly is the scene of bouts between men in the service. It is predicted that after the war boxing will become even more popular than it was before the conflict began, and that the future will see more international boxing contests than have ever been staged before.

Arrangements are already under way for a busy winter, and it is not unlikely that a number of the more prominent American boxers will be invited to go over to England to meet some of the better known fighters on the other side. Eugene Corri, the famous British boxing man, and James H. Douglas are in charge of arrangements for the winter tournament, and are striving to arrange the match between Bombardier Wells, who still is popular in England, and Jack Dempsey.

Another match that may be put on during the winter will be between Jimmy Wilde, the British flyweight titleholder, and Joe Lynch, the American bantamweight, who is now in France as a soldier.
