#### SERIES OF KICKS

Dear News:  
I want to see, just as soon as it can possibly be done, all the wheat for export from Alberta go through a government elevator and pass through the Panama Canal to Liverpool and foreign ports and the Far East. No, Mr. Editor, the above is not an extract from a speech of the Dominion ministers delivered in Prince Rupert, but from a speech of the Hon. J. D. Reid in Vancouver.

Did you notice the difference in the way the Ministers were handled in Vancouver and the way we entertained them here? Here that Old Women's Club, called the Board of Trade, invited them to a secret session. What took place the press did not report.

The Canadian Club gave them a dinner and allowed them to spread themselves, then they addressed a public meeting where they told us what a great country we had, but never a word about the fishing industry or the dry-dock. They told us we must produce wealth to pay the National Debt, but still leave our greatest wealth producer idle.

After they leave us we are informed that steel cannot be obtained, so we are just where we were four years ago. Carvell told us at the luncheon that we were an intelligent looking lot of people, and we ought to be able to get up and do something.

Vancouver has secured the contract to build eight steel ships of 10,000 tons each. Yet no steel here. WHY?

In Vancouver the Ministers were told by delegation after delegation that they had to have certain things and they were going to have them. They were not afraid to tell them that Vancouver suspected sinister influences were at work, and they got what they wanted.

The people in Prince Rupert are treated like children who must not be told too much. Even the City Council hints at certain performances performed by the new Sanitary Inspector that the public should not know of.

The Hospital Board in recent session asked the press not to publish the proceedings. Yet our papers publish the number of flu cases and deaths in other cities.

What we need here is an organization of the people who will go right after our visitors and demand our just rights and who will keep going till we get them.
