The laundries which have been badly crippled by the employees being down with flu are once more working steadily and in a few days expect to handle their business as usual.

J. D. McLeod received a telegram yesterday telling of the death of his brother in Vancouver from the effects of influenza. Visitors to the city reported seeing him a week ago, when he was well.

There have been no deaths at the General Hospital since yesterday, and the condition of the majority of the patients continues to be satisfactory. There were eight new cases admitted yesterday and four patients discharged.

There were two new cases admitted to the Borden Street Emergency Hospital yesterday, and since yesterday four patients have recovered sufficiently to be discharged. The condition of the remainder of the patients now under treatment continues satisfactory.

J. H. Morton, of the G. T. P. locomotive staff, sailed last evening for Los Angeles, and will bring his wife and daughter north. Mr. Morton has been running out of Prince Rupert for the last seven years over the G. T. P. and this is the first time he has been south in that time. Mr. Morton's home is in Prince George.

**DIES THIS MORNING**

**John Budenich Passes Away At His Father's House, Third Avenue.**

The death of John Budenich, son of Tony Budenich, took place at his father's home this morning on Third Avenue as the result of an attack of influenza. Johnny Budenich was assistant to his father in his store, the Third Ave. Meat Market, and was universally liked by all who came in contact with him. He was a young man of about twenty-one, and his death will be regretted by all who knew him.

**HOPED FOR A PLAGUE IN AMERICAN RANKS**

**German Father Wrote to Officer That "They Ought to Hang Wilson to a Tree."**

With the American Army in France, November 1.—Here is an extract of a letter from his father to a German officer:

"What do you think of our enemies now? Is it not simply hair raising? Haven't those dogs got enough throttling already? So it seems to me we must simply go on. Plague ought to break out among this brood, and they ought to hang Wilson to the nearest tree. Also, one would not think it possible for the French, at least the Government, to waste men to fight on further. Probably also other parts of their land will even yet be devastated."

Here is an extract from a letter from a parent of another German officer, who does not find the food supply so adequate:

"Dear Hans: In case you can get any butter up to twenty marks a pound, or bacon about the same price, then buy us a few pounds. We have never yet received the Breslau sugar, and have given up hopes that it is coming. If you can get any tobacco, please bring it along, too. We want to meet you at the station, so that you will not have so much to carry, for it always looks so bad to see a high ranking soldier come in so laden down. Perhaps you can let us know when and where the train arrives in Berlin.

"Our Fritz Gnirsch, our billy-goat, is going to be butchered on Thursday, so that we can have fresh mutton for our birthday."

**BAN WAS PLACED ON 40 CITIES AND TOWNS**

Forty towns and cities in the Province of British Columbia have been classed within the inhibition edict. Their names and the date upon which the order in council proclaimed the Spanish influenza regulations in force follows: Victoria, Oak Bay, Esquimalt and Saanich, October 8; North Vancouver, Duncan, Cumberland and Union Bay, October 10; Salmon Arm, October 11; Prince Rupert, Courtenay, October 15; Nanaimo, New Westminster, Ladysmith, October 15; Prince George, Point Grey, October 17; Kamloops, Vancouver, Anxox, October 18; Grand Forks, Kelowna, Michel, North Vancouver district, October 19; Port Alberni, October 20; Nelson, Rossland, October 21; Kaslo, Cranbrook, Merritt, Trail, Vernon, Langley, Kent, October 22; Revelstoke, Maple Ridge, October 23; Greenwood, Chilliwack, New Denver and district, October 24.

There were no applications for the ban from any section of the province this morning, nor were there any additional alarms from those points, mentioned in these columns as experiencing great difficulty in the lack of proper medical and nursing attention.
