Overhauling Relief Bureaux

WASHINGTON, D.C., April 26.—After increased administration reorganization powers which were recently conferred upon him by Congress, President Franklin D. Roosevelt is considering plans to overhaul relief bureaux, making their heads more directly answerable to himself.

In a message to Congress yesterday, the President disclosed that he was planning to set up three major agencies under his reorganization program—one to handle work progress, another social security and a third, loans. The program will go into operation within ninety days and the President stated he would have at least two more messages for Congress within the coming week.

There is still considerable opposition to the reorganization program but there is considered to be little likelihood of it being seriously disturbed now.

Queen Favors Longer Skirts

LONDON, April 26.—Queen Elizabeth, it is reported in style circles, will shun short skirts in the wardrobe for her forthcoming visit to Canada and the United States. While skirts fourteen to sixteen inches from the ground are at present quite the thing, the Queen will favor eight to ten inches.
