Consideration of reports of various committees of the British Columbia Teachers' Federation provided a full evening's discussion at the regular monthly meeting of the Prince Rupert Teachers' Association last night in the Booth Memorial School with J. S. Wilson in the chair.

The resignation as treasurer of the local association of Miss K. Laing, who resigned from the local teaching staff at the close of last year, was accepted with regret. To fill the vacancy C. H. Leighs was appointed. The president also welcomed new teachers to the staff of the Prince Rupert Schools and as members of the local association.

Consideration of educational finance from both the provincial and the local point of view took up some time. The many committees working on this phase have accumulated considerable data and a special salary committee has been appointed to bring in a report to the next meeting of the association. Some recent information in this connection proved of outstanding interest to the meeting. The subject of educational finance had also been discussed at a joint meeting of members of the Provincial Parent-Teacher Federation, the British Columbia Teachers' Federation and the British Columbia School Trustees Association.

Other reports dealt with the British Columbia Teachers' Federation benevolent fund length of Junior High School teaching day, Textbook Branch and its activities, the preparation of an art manual more in keeping with the course of study outlined and the size of classes.
