ROME, Feb. 2: (CP) - Premier Benito Mussolini paid homage to Fascism's black shirt fighters yesterday when he reviewed militiamen on the occasion of the sixteenth anniversary of the founding of the Fascist militia but he did so without indicating on what front they might fight again. Il Duce refrained from speaking even a few words as he distributed medals to survivors of the Spanish and Ethiopian war dead.
