

In 1919 he was elected to the House of Representatives, receiving more preference votes than any other candidate.

On the occasion of his silver jubilee as Mayor of Brussels, when he refused to allow any celebrations, King Leopold III. invested him with the Grand Cordon of the Order of Leonold with the Golden Border. a distinction specially created for him. Among his foreign decorations was that of the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honor, a rank usually reserved for heads of states.




