RED CROSS WORK

The Red Cross Society has been organized in Prince Rupert and already the committees are at work getting ready for practical help to the soldiers and sailors and others who need assistance during war time.

The Red Cross is the leading society doing war work throughout the nation. Every town and village has or will have its organization with groups of men and women engaged in its various activities. It provides comforts for the men, supplementing the very meagre army rations. It provides materials for use in case of the wounded and for the sick in hospitals.

Most of the work is done by groups of noble women who give of their time and labor without thought of reward. For the time being the soldiers are their children and the wounded are their special care.

During the First Great War the Red Cross did splendid work in Prince Runert and there is not the chadow of doubt but they will do the same again and even more. First the people have to be shown the way when the response will be general.

Because of the presence in the city of bundreds of soldiers. times are better than they might have been. Other defence work to provide employment which makes navrolls in the city. Because of these conditions the people generally are better able to support the Red Cross than if there had been no such income coming to the city, Because of this and because of their known interest in the men who will do the fighting, we have confidence that the people of the city will extend themselves in supporting the Red Cross this winter and throughout the war.

APPEAL FOR HELPLESS There is in Prince Rupert 2 group of men who cannot be classed as able bodied men and

who are not able to do very hard work and yet in some positions would give as good service as if they were graded A1. Most of them are between sixty and seventy years of age and, therefore, not eligible for pensions under our present laws. It was for these men that Commissioner W. J. A'der made a plea when he brought the matter of old age pensions to the attention of the Prince Rupert Chamber of Commerce and secured its support for an appeal to have the pensions given at 60 instead of 70. They might be employed only they cannot earn the minimum wage so they are paid the regular relief allowance of \$11.10 a month, which as everyone will agree is not sufficient to keen any man in any degree of comfort these days. However, they have the privilege of doing add jobs in order to supplement this amount if they have sufficient energy and aggression to get
