Mrs. Prevost Was Leader In Army

Well Known Metlakatla Woman Had Been Identified With Salvationist Work For Many Years

The death occurred on Thursday evening at the Prince Rupert General Hospital, of Mrs. Prevost, wife of Field Captain Henry Prevost, commanding officer of the Salvation Army at Metlakatla. Mrs. Prevost was one of the pioneers of Army work in the village of Metlakatla, having been a member of the organization for the past twenty-eight years. She leaves to mourn her loss three sons and two daughters.

Funeral arrangements in the hands of the B.C. Undertakers and the funeral will be held on Monday afternoon from the Prince Rupert Salvation Army Citadel. Captain Ivan Halsey will officiate.

SENATOR IS DEAD

Hon. John Stewart McLennan Passes Away In Ottawa At Age Of Eighty-Six

HIS CAREER

Came From Sydney, Nova Scotia, And Was Prominent In Coal Industry

OTTAWA, September 16: (CP)—Senator John Stewart McLennan, aged 86, of Sydney, Nova Scotia, died yesterday after a two-day illness. He had come here to attend the special war session of Parliament.

John Stewart McLennan's early ambition was to be a professor of philosophy but defective eyesight hampered his studies and turned his efforts into more prosaic channels.

Returning from Cambridge University in England where he took honors in philosophy and the moral sciences he entered his father's grain business in Montreal, the city where he was born November 5, 1853.

He moved to the industrial districts of Cape Breton in 1882 when coal mining was in its ascendancy and the steel mills of Sydney were yet to be built. His first work was that of manager of the International mine at Old Bridgeport. Later he was managing director of the International Coal Company until the Dominion Coal Company was formed by H. M. Whitney of Boston in 1893 to consolidate ownership of the Cape Breton pits.

When Whitney, John F. Stairs and Graham Fraser of New Glasgow came to Sydney in 1899, McLennan was present at the meeting which led to the formation of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company. He became first general manager of the company when the first steel was produced. A year later he retired as general manager and, deciding to make his home in Cape Breton, bought an

Waterfront Whiffs

Halibut Landings Not So Heavy This Week But Prices Better—Deer Hunting Opens But Not Much Interest Shown—Herring Seiners Arrive

Halibut landings at Prince Rupert for the past week totalled 363,800 pounds of which 270,800 pounds was from Canadian vessels and 93,500 pounds from American. This brought the total landings for the season to date up to 14,271,700 pounds consisting of 6,498,900 pounds from Canadian boats and 7,772,800 pounds from American.

Prices during the past week at Prince Rupert showed an improvement but not as marked as that which was recorded during the same week at the port of Seattle. For Canadian fish the high price of the week was 9.7c and 5c paid the Domino II. and Unome for catches of 7,500 and 3,500 pounds respectively while the low price was 7.3c and 5c which the Fanny F. received for 8,500 pounds. The high price of the week for American fish was 10.9c and 5c which the Excel was paid for 18,000 pounds and the low 5c straight which the Visitor received for 8,000 pounds. With the 1934 halibut fishing season closing on September 22 as far as issuance of final licences to boats is concerned, the 1934 season seems already assured of running well ahead of 1933 in volume of fish landed.

The deer hunting season opened last Saturday but, owing to so many local people being engaged directly

or indirectly in war activities and the weather being exceedingly bad, its commencement was almost unheralded and there was but little doing in the pursuit of the wily game. It will not be until the third season opens that much hunting activity will be evident here, it is anticipated.

To seine for herring in this district as soon as the fish start running, the boats W. No. 9, Capt. R. Gammon, and Ivana, Capt. Martin Skog, arrived in port this week from Vancouver. They will be operated out of Butedale in connection with the Canadian Fishing Co.'s reduction plant there. The Ivana is a brand new vessel which was recently completed in Vancouver.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. John Boden, arrived in port at 7:15 last evening from the south and sailed at 10:30 on her return to Vancouver and waypoints.

estate on the northern shore of Sydney Harbor, where he built Petersfield.

In 1904 he bought The Sydney Post and 29 years later saw it merge with its competitor The Sydney Post-Record.

Work Recognized Though a businessman, his interest in the historical seaport of Louisbourg began during his first year in Cape Breton and later won him recognition in the world of letters. He lived to see some of the works of the ancient French fortresses excavated and restored and a federal museum built 53 years later, largely due to his efforts and the interest inspired by his book "Louisbourg from its Fall." Tribute was paid to Senator McLennan's work by Lord Tweedsmuir, governor-general who opened the museum which houses the Senator's collection of relics, in 1937.

The son of Hugh McLennan and Isabella Stewart, his wife, he went to high school in Montreal, later to McGill University where he received the bachelor of arts degree and the Dufferin Gold Medal in 1878. He took first-class honors in philosophy. At Cambridge he took the Moral Sciences Tripos, McGill honored him with a Doctor of Laws Degree in 1923. His works won him recognition when he was named a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society (England).

A year before he moved to Cape Breton he married Louise, daughter of Francis Bradley of Chicago. They had five children, one of whom, Hugh, a sergeant in the Fifth Battery, was killed in action at Ypres, in April, 1915. Other children are, Mrs. J. W. Farley, Needham, Mass., Hugh McLennan of Paris, Mrs. H. H. Kendall, Windsor, N. S. and Miss Katharine McLennan, Sydney, N. S. His wife died in 1912.

In 1915 he married Grace Henop, widow of R. de P. Tytus, Berkshire County, Mass. His second wife died in 1924, leaving one son, John Stewart McLennan, Jr.

During the war Senator McLennan was a member of the Military Hospitals Commission and served as a council member of the patriotic fund. In 1918 he was appointed as Canada's delegate to the Inter-Allied Conference for the care of the disabled. A Conservative in politics he was called to the Canadian Senate in 1916.
