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FAST LINE FOR SOUTH AMERICA

Just as Soon as the Panama Is Completed Steamers Will Be Ready to Secure the Growing Trade.

(Special to Daily News.) Washington, Feb. 1.—Six large fast steamers will be in readiness to inaugurate a new passenger line between Valparaiso, Chile, and New York, when the Panama Canal is completed.

Hudson Bay Land Sales. The Hudson Bay Company's land sales for the nine months to December 31st, 1911, were 33,000 acres for \$624,000, and town lots were sold for \$700,000, as compared with sales of farm lands, 99,400 acres for \$1,001,000 and town lots for \$265,500 for the corresponding period of 1910.

HARRY THAW SEEKS TO BE SET AT LIBERTY AGAIN

SHOOTER OF STANFORD WHITE ARGUES IN LIGHT OF THE O'SHAUGHNESSY CASE THAT HE IS ENTITLED TO HIS FREEDOM.

Harry K. Thaw, it is said, soon will make another effort to obtain his release from Matteawan. He probably will base his contention that he is entitled to his liberty the same as Mrs. Francis O'Shaughnessy, who murdered her husband on May 5 last in New York, and who paroled by the court in the custody of her attorney, Jeremiah T. Mahony, and Dr. Wm. Maybon, in charge of Ward's Island.

Thaw is of the opinion that the case of Mrs. O'Shaughnessy and his own are identical, and if the woman is entitled to her freedom so is he. Judge Warren W. Foster, of general sessions of New York, was questioned recently as to the similarity of the Thaw case with that of Mrs. O'Shaughnessy. He said: "Although the court followed the Thaw case and acted on it as a precedent for the O'Shaughnessy trial, yet I do not think Thaw can establish a case making the release of the O'Shaughnessy woman as a precedent. She was paroled by the court for her own good, not that the court feared she would be a menace to the community at large.

"Thaw was placed by the court in a criminal institution for the insane because he was considered dangerous and a menace to society. Of course some other judge may look at it in a different light."

The judge was asked if he did not think Thaw is entitled to his liberty, since he contends he is sane and no longer a homicidal maniac, as was represented in the case of the woman slayer. "Certainly," he replied, "if Thaw is a sane man he should have his liberty."

Dr. Graeme Hammond, of No. 60 West Fifty-fifth street, said Mrs. O'Shaughnessy could demand her release from Ward's Island any day, and if Dr. Maybon held her against her will he would be subject to legal action. Dr. Hammond added he thinks Thaw is sane and should be liberated. He said that it was Thaw's own fault that he was not at liberty.

"Jerome told me once that if Thaw would remain in Matteawan quietly for a few years he would not oppose his release," he said. "Thaw is of an excitable temperament and tried to rush things."

Edwin Taliaferro, lawyer, of No. 5 Beekman street, was asked if he considered that Thaw could use the O'Shaughnessy case as a precedent in habeas corpus proceedings. The attorney said it is unnecessary for Thaw to use any other case as a precedent, and that he has a right to a trial by jury to pass on his sanity. Thaw's imprisonment is unconstitutional, he added.

"I have had similar cases in other jurisdictions and states, and in every case a jury trial was granted, and I consider the proceedings in the Thaw case illegal," Taliaferro said.

LET'S TALK IN BILLIONS NOW

Immense Wealth of United States Invested in Railways and Industrials—7 Per Cent. Increase in Number of Stockholders.

The New York Journal of Commerce has completed its customary annual canvass of the number of stockholders in the principal large corporations in the United States. The returns cover 234 separate railroad and industrial concerns, whose combined capitalization is \$10,714,575,719. Of these 91 are railroads, having a capitalization of \$5,431,852,174, and 143 are industrials, with a capitalization of \$5,279,723,545. The number of stockholders in these 234 railroads and industrial corporations is 980,399, their average holdings being 109 1/4 shares. The decrease in the average holdings is six shares. The increase in the total number of stockholders is 64,596, or 7 per cent.; the increase in the total capital is \$159,465,178, or 1 1/2 per cent. The number of stockholders owning the \$5,431,852,174 of railroad capital is 389,571, their average holdings 139 1/4 shares. The number of stockholders owning the \$5,279,723,545 of capital in the industrials is 590,828, their average holdings being 81 1/4 shares.
