HEARING IS PROCEEDING

Deportation Case of Harry Bridges Goes Into Second Week

SAN FRANCISCO, July 17:- Ex-Communist John Leech will return to the witness stand tomorrow morning when the second week of the Harry Bridges' deportation hearing opens on Angel Island as the United States seeks to deport the West Coast C. I. O. elader to Australia on grounds that he is a Communist and that the Communist party advocates overthrow the government.

Bridges denies that he is a Communist and his defence is attempting to prove that the part; does not advocate violent overthrow of the government.

Leech testified last week that Bridges was active in the Communist movement and was elected! a member of the Communist Party National Central Committee.

Tomorrow defence attorneys are expected to produce an affidavit, signed by Leech, stating that he never saw Bridges at a Communistic meeting and that he did not believe the labor leader was a

member of the party. Leech admitted last week that! he had made such an affidavit but said that he did so under threats from members of the party. He insisted that his testimony at the Bridges' hearing was the truth and nothing but the truth.

On several acasions lately an enormous marine monster has been seen, it is reported by fishermen from the entrance of Skidegate Narrows. It is described as looking like a huge eel with long antennae on each side of its head which resembles that of a sea lion.
