BAKED FISH

Select an oily meaty variety of fish weighing from 3 to 5 pounds, clean and scale, removing the fins with scissors. Rub the inside of the fish with salt, sew up the cavity and place back up, in a well oiled baking pan. Brush all over with cooking oil and place in a hot oven (500 deg. Fahr.) for 10 minutes or until the fish begins to brown. Reduce the heat to about 350 deg. and continue to bake for 30 to 45 minutes—depending on the thickness of the fish. Chill and serve cold with lettuce, parsley and eggs stuffed with sardines.
